Heated four-way tie for first in Georgetown flag football

The goal of every league is to someday reach parity, that rare state where any one team can beat another. The trouble is that it's usually just a pipe dream. Not so in the G.F.F.L. With only four regular season games to go, four teams are tied for first place and one is two points back.

Proving this week that last week's performances were no flukes, Wimpy's and the Dairy Queen flattened the leaders again. In fact, all four double-headers were sweeps, as Wimpy's beat the Smoke Shop 33-21, Dairy Queen downed the Greeks 35-30, Foberts won a thriller over the Glen 33-22, and Dave's BP dropped the Hogs 24-9.

The result is that Wimpy's, Delrex, the Greeks and Dave's BP deadlocked in first, with the Dairy Queen only two points back.

When a team is in a slump as the Dairy Queen was only two short weeks ago, they often need someone to personally carry them out of it. Fifty-three points in two games certainly qualifies as a lift and that's what Jeff Lockwood supplied the D.Q. That, coupled with the insertion of Mitch Leblanc at quarterback, and the stellar defensive play of Joe South, led to back to back wins over the powerful Greeks.

The Greeks got off the mark early when Bill Rivers scored and James Allen caught a two point conversion, which was quickly followed by a TD to John Karolidis and another convert by Allen.

Lockwood got rolling in the second quarter catching two Leblanc passes for majors and adding one convert as well as a two point safety. He also matched the Greeks point for point in the second half scoring two more touchdowns and two converts. John Halliburton had the other major for the D.Q.

The Greeks stayed in it to the end however, on scores by John Prithard and Rick

The "big play" made the difference in the Wimpy's-Delrex game and both times that play went to Wimpy's. First they recovered their own kick-off for a touchdown in the first quarter to quickly put the Smokers in a hole. Then in the fourth quarter with the Smoke Shop threatening to dig themselves out John Clark hit Bob Lockwood for a 40 yard gain which led to their final touchdown.

Just as in their first game, the Smoke Shop found themselves down by three touchdowns early in the second quarter. Dave Robertson burned the right side of the defense for the Wimpy's first
