Board testing courses on drugs

The Halton Board of Education will be field-testing new programs on drug education in selected schools this fall, ready for implementation next

Director of education Em Lavender said last week the program-writing team has completed a new curriculum for drug education which will be tested in the schools. This was one of the steps recommended following the release of a report by the Addiction Research Foundation (ARF) which showed a high incidence of drug and alcohol abuse among student. in Halton.

Mr. Lavender brought the board up to date on actions taken by the board's executive committee following the release of the report to deal with the problem.

Dick O'Brien, who works for the Addiction Research Foundation, will be spending half his time with the board, to provide education for guidance counsellors and staff training for teachers, and to help principals organize evening programs for parents, to provide them with the facts and the background on drug

Mr. Lavender said he and his staff will be meeting with Halton Regional Police to maintain liaison with the police department and to learn what the board can do to help soive the problem, and its responsibilities in law enforce-

The board will also seek revisions in the Petty Trespass Act to help keep those who don't belong away from school

The board will also send a copy of the study to the Minister of Consumer Relations to emphasize the need for the elimination of lifestyle advertising for alcoholic beverages.

Traffic charges up 40%

The number of charges laid for traffic offences in Halton in the first six months of this year has increased 38.5 per cent over the same period last year, Halton Regional Police Chief James, Harding told the police commission Aug. 14.

In the first six months of 1960, 18,393 charges were laid against drivers under the Criminal Code, provincial statutes and municipal bylaws, as compared to 13,275 for the same period last year, the chief said.

The number of accidents has decreased from 2,569 in 1979 to 2,316, but the number of fatalities and injuries has increased slightly, from 1,068 last year to 1,072 this year.

Resource recovery

coming?

Halton region may someday be the site for a multi-material resource recovery pilot

project. A recommendation that the region support Ontario environment minister Harry Parrott's suggestion that Halton be chosen the location was approved at regional council on Wednesday.

Russ Miller, chairman of the region's solid waste management committee, said the region is very happy with the proposal.

The committee recommended to council that regional chairman Jack Raftis arrange a meeting between Halton representatives and officials from the ministries of energy and the environment, to discuss possible energy recovery options through source separations and resource recovery.

The pilot project being considered for Halton is an energy-from-waste project planned by Ontario Paper Company Ltd., a Thoroldbased firm. The project would involve the construction of a waste newspaper de inking plant, which is expected to begin operations in October of
