### Georgetown defeats Welland

# Thrilling cricket victory in back and forth match

The Georgetown visit to Welland provided another thrilling cricket victory with the advantage changing hands several times before Georgetown scored the winning run with two balls left in the last over.

Welland won the toss and batted first, but with the score 5, Windsor bowled Paters. Both Rammarine and Windsor were unlucky not to get the incoming batsman Shivaprasad caught out as he slipped balls through the slips. 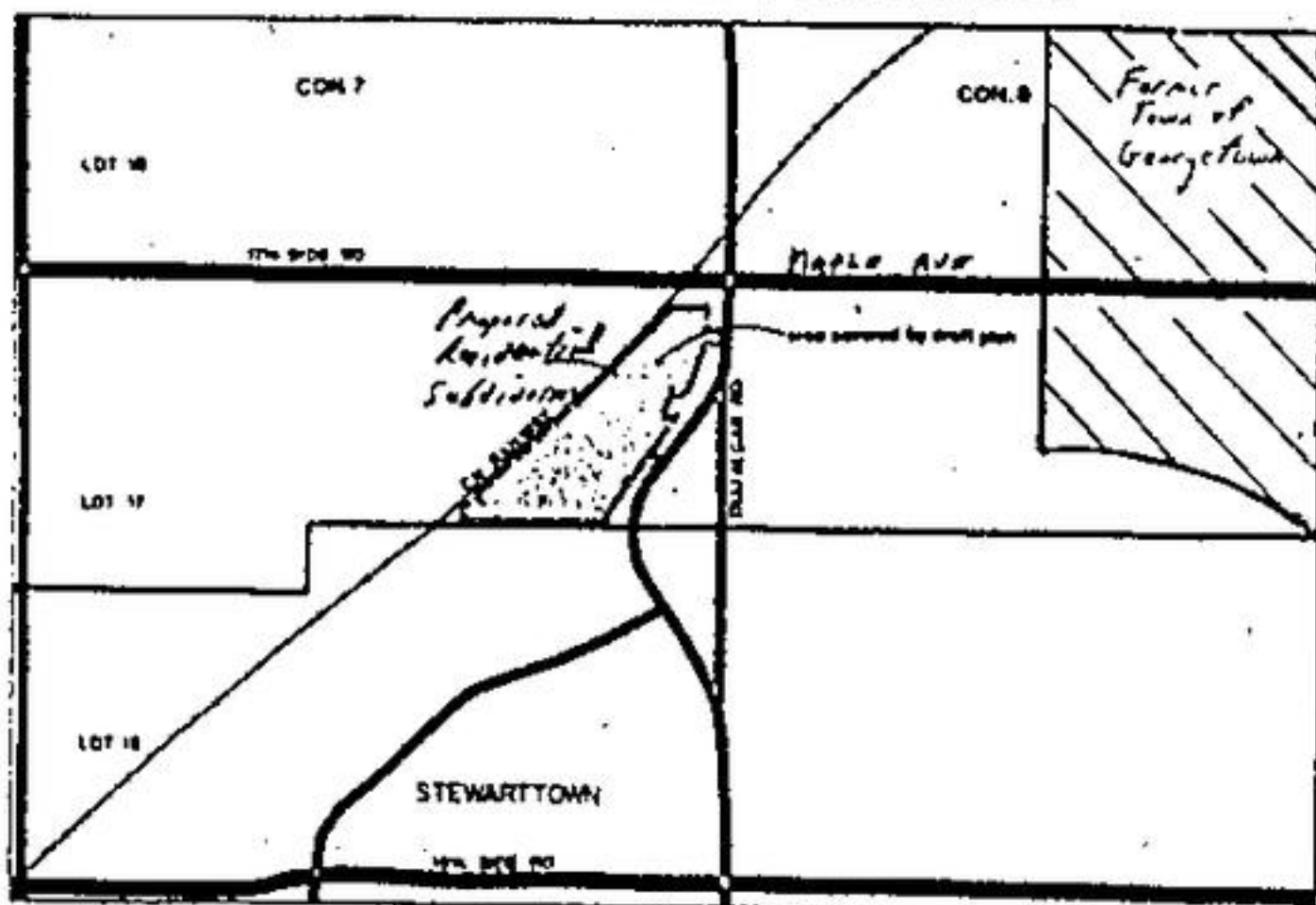
