Paul Nazy of Hamilton and his two sons 12 and 6-year-old, and Nazy's friend from Burlington drowned while SALMON fishing on Lake Ontario last weekend. The lake was so wild but these two took it upon themselves to go fishing. Lake Ontario is a "Wild Woman" and we are but mortal men. Take a warning and "have an eye".

Further to last week's report on the dams of the Credit River, Lancone Contracting of Weston has started work on the modification to the old Mill Dam in Georgetown and Ontario Construction of St. Catharines is doing the dredging work above the dam.

Two spillways will be installed as the water pressure will be too great for just one, and these will be constructed on the east side of the structure. One will be a water control for high water and the other will be a fish pass, enabling the fish to reach the spawning areas at the upper reaches of the Credit River. Until that time the fish will have to make use of somewhat poorer spawning grounds between Georgetown and Norval. Completion date should be about mid December.

FOXY II, with Bob Fox of Credit River Boats in Norval has been hitting the fish out on Lake Ontario. If it's right, a young girl took an 18.22 pound fish last weekend. Fishing Factory is another of the boats that are getting into the action, and Al Bowden and Doug Hole of Georgetown were out on that boat recently, coming home with a 9 1/2 pound COHO and what is purported to be a BROWN TROUT that weighed 3 1/2 pounds.

Unfortunately the person at the weigh-in station would not even weigh the fish as he claimed that it was a Rainbow Trout and not worth putting in the contest. This could be prevented by knowing how to identify these various fish and insisting on another opinion if the weigh-in attendant is in doubt. Al Bowden kept it simple by just catching a Coho, but that came on the scales at 9.87 pounds.

TV BOB  
This week we went out with the T.V. Cameras and produced a show with Dale Wood of Credit River Boats. In fact Sept. 15 was CREDIT RIVER BOAT DAY, and this show will be on Halton Hills Cable this week and repeated next week. Watch also for another one, as we intend to do another later this week or next. Wood is now taking charters and is running a 21 foot Glastron Sea Fury that will take five persons. Rates are standard and the man seems to know the lake and the fish pretty well.

Here is a tip for taking all manner of fish while trolling; use a three-way swivel. Bottom eye tie on 12 inches of Mono line and a deep-diving crank bait. On upper eye use 24-36 inch dropper with your favorite streamer fly. Or use a flashy spoon and a jig or a fly. The deep diver will get the fly or jig down and the fish have a choice of dinner.

# Superb passing plays lead Wimpy's to win

Owen replaced Wimpy's injured pivot John Clark and led the team to an exciting come-from-behind 35-28 win over the Greeks, Sunday in flag football action.

Baldwin put the Greeks up by seven, in the third quarter, hitting Mike Miehun. But Wimpy's once again came back on a fine catch by Greg Halonen to tie the game.

The Greeks gambled later in the match on third down inside their own 40, but it backfired as Lockwood capped a great personal effort by picking off the pass and returning it for the winning touchdown. He also had five converts.

The Greeks don't die easily though, and in the last minute of the game had marched to the Wimpy eight. Baldwin rolled out and fired what looked like a sure strike, only to have Gord McNeilly save Wimpy's bacon with a clutch interception.

Dan Reynolds and Paul Wilson had first quarter TDs for the Greeks with two point converts going to Mark Russell and Bill Rivers.

In the battle of the basement Glen Williams climbed into seventh place on a second half surge that carried them to a narrow 24-22 win over the Halton Hogs.

Georgetown started their innings cautiously through R. Mongru and J. Balkissoon, who put 21 for the opening wicket before Balkissoon was clean bowled for four runs. However R. Mongru played some fine shots and kept the scorers busy. He made two brilliant hooks off bumpers sending the ball to the ropes with great ferocity. K. Lakham at the other end tried to hit Springer and was bowled for seven.

Cambridge won the toss and elected to bat on an easy paced wicket. However A. Windsor and K. Ramnarine, opening the Georgetown attack, took full advantage of the breezy conditions and had the Cambridge batsmen in trouble with some excellent "swing" bowling, with the new ball.

Ramnarine drew the "first blood" by trapping Watson LBW for one. Windsor followed the suit by having B. Springer well caught by Mongru for eight. V. Forde and M.
