not even weigh the fish as he claimed that it was a Rainbow Trout and not worth putting in the contest. This could be prevented by knowing how to identify these various fish and insisting on another opinion if the weigh-in attendant is it doubt. Al Bowden kept it simple by just catching a Coho, but that came on the scales at 9.87 pounds. TV BOB

Here is a tip for taking all manner of fish while trolling; use a three-way swivel. Bottom eye tie on 12 inches of Mono line and a deep-diving crank bait. On upper eye use 24-36 inch dropper with your favorite streamer fly. Or use a flashy spoon and a jlg or a fly. The deep diver will get the fly or jig down and the fish have a choice of dinner.
