# Office opened for data service

An emergency medical identification system known as Medical Data Bureau has est-

ablished an office in Halton. The system puts a person's entire medical history on a microfilm chip embedded in a plastic, wallet-sized card. The information includes the cardholder's blood type, allergies and even whether or not he wears contact lenses.

A checklist of illness is also included, ranging from heart trouble and high blood pressure to hemophilia, with detalls of current medication and

drugs being taken. The bureau is also useful for healthy people because if a person is unconscious, the docfor needs to know his medical history before he can begin treatment. He needs to know the patient has no allergies to drugs before he can begin prescribing anything.

Bob Hatcher, president of the Burlington-based office said about 95 per cent of the hospitals in Ontario have microfilm randers, but for those who don't there is a toll-free number in Kitchener which where the information can be obtained 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Each cardbearer is identified by a code number to maintain confidentiality.

Individual memberships in the bureau cost \$18 for three years, with updated cards avallable during that period for \$2.50. Family memberships are \$38. Senior citizens over 60 receive a lifetime membership after their initial payment.

#### Trafalgar

Representatives of Halton region's public works department, the ministry of transportation and communications and King Paving and Materials Ltd. will soon meet to plan repair work for Trafalgar Road between Maple Avenue in Georgetown and Upper Middle Road in Oakville.

Work done on the stretch of road last year has been extensively damaged by gravel trucks travelling to and from construction sites in the area. Public works committee chairman Ron Planche said last week that truck weights had exceeded the expectations of the works department by almost 80 per cent, damaging a bottom coat of asphalt laid last
