Unilater al action on the constitution by the federal government is a "frightening prospect," Brampton-Georgetown MP John McDermid

'Get province's help,' majority tells Jelinek

Brampton-Georgetown MP John McDermid may not have been voicing party opinion last week when he challenged the prime minister's right to act alone in amending Canada's Constitution (Conservative leader Joe Clark suggested the opposite two days later), but fellow Tory Otto Jelinek has discovered substantial opposition to any unilateral move by the Liberal government.

Mr. Jelinek, whose Halton riding includes Acton. announced the results of a summer questionnaire last week distributed among constituents. Nearly 62 per cent of those polled, he reported, oppose unilateral amendment of the Constitution without guidance from the provinces.

More than 75 per cent indicated that any amendments should have provincial guidance. Overall, 83.1 per

cent favor the British North America Act's return to Canada from its current "home" in Britain.

Through other questions, Mr. Jelinek found that a majority of constituents believe the federal government should have more power over the provinces.

While 57.3 per cent are dissatisfied with the current balance of power, 51.2 per cent favor increasing federal powers and 33.6 per cent oppose the idea. Another 44.4 per cent, on the other hand, would like to see provincial authority enhanced further.

Mr. Jelinek also took the opportunity to poll voters on the mortgage and property tax credit proposed by the former Clark government. Should the Trudeau government introduce such a program now, he asked? About 60 per cent feel is should. Other questionnaire re-

Jelinek heads west


