Alliance Church visitor was missionary abroad

Women's liberation means a new life in Christ for the Stone Age tribeswoman in Irian Jaya, according to Lois Belsey, who visited Georgetown last week to address the annual missionary conference of the Georgetown Alliance Church, at 14 Main Street South.

Miss Belsey, a Canadian missionary nurse with the Christian and Missionary Alliance in Indonesia since 1976, spoke about her work among the primitive women of the Moni tribe in Irian Jaya.

"The highlight of my ministry is to see the joy in the eyes of Moni women, considered by their tribal society to be on the level of pigs, when they learn to teach other women about Jesus Christ," she said.

Born and raised in Midland, Miss Belsey is a graduate of Canadian Bible College in Regina, and received her nurse's training in Hadsen-Hamilton and Edmonton.

Founded in 1887, the Christian and Missionary Alliance is an evangelical denomination with over 10,000 churches and an inclusive membership of more than one million in 47 countries, and with an overseas missionary staff of 978.

She told of how she has been able to teach them to read, write, sew, and teach from the Bible.

Second Masonic fraternity consecrated in Georgetown

A second Masonic fraternity was founded in Georgetown Friday night as 56 Grand Lodge officers, including the Ontario Grand Lodge Master at the Credit Lodge temple on Trafalgar Road.

Masons raised approximately \$70,000 from members this year. Held in trust, \$20,000 per year in interest from the amount will go to the deal for research and equipment.

Dressed in full Masonic regalia the gold embroidered lodge and the traditional Masonic apron with insignia the officers and visiting Masons held a banquet in Sir George's Anglican Church hall before moving to the Credit Lodge Temple to consecrate the new lodge. Masons throughout the province are currently celebrating the 125th anniversary of the founding of Ontario's Credit Lodge.

"We do a lot of work," Mr. Carpenter said, "but we just give quietly and continuously." The Masons also offer numerous bursaries to high school students who can prove need and receive their diploma before entering university. People think the Masonic order is shrouded in secrecy, Mr. Carpenter said, because the Masons do not seek a great deal of publicity. "We're not a full-blooded charitable organization," he said, adding that most of the money raised for the deaf in Ontario comes from the pockets of the 110,000 Masons in the province.
