Football fever is back at GDHS

Thanks to Gary Lockwood, his 55 junior Rebel teammates and their five coaches, interest in the full contact sport around the venerable old learning institution is again on the rise and is now fast becoming a pre-requisite to gaining school colors and being named a true Rebel.

The reason for the sport's resurgance in prominance is Thursday's junior Halton contest with top ranked Blakelock of Oakville. The Rebels came within one touchdown and a two-point conversion of tying the visiting team here on their own turf. It was the best effort a junior squad had put forth in three years according to Neil Cotton one of the coaches. Yesterday (Tuesday) the team hosted Queen Elizabeth Park of Oakville before a larger more enthusiastic audience.

In recent years the popularity of the game at the local level has been waning to the point where the after-class confrontations drew more coaching staff members than spectators, not to mention the players who dwarfed their fans by at least two to one in numbers, on the bright sunny days they engaged in head to head combat. The inability of the school to produce a winner, or even

a reasonable facsimile of a near-contender, among either the junior or senior ranks culminated their recruiting program. this season when not enough senior ball players could be assembled to safely field a team. The number of experienced grid iron veterans (those with at least a year's wear in the equipment) for this team would not be adequate enough to go ahead without facing the same dismal prospects which have occured these latest campaigns.

THIS YEAR IS DIFFERENT This year is different. With the number of interested grade nine students, and the helmets and pads available, a large junior team was comprised. Twenty-two of the 56 players are returnees from the team's 1979 edition.

In their first game of the season (they had no pre-season play), against Blakelock, the inexperienced (gamewise) group of boys suffered through first half jitters allowing only two louchdown scores against them while picking up one themselves on a three-yard drive by Lockwood.

Lockwood came on in the second half to score his and

picked up in the final two quarters turning back the Tabbies on all but one attempt. The final score was 21-13.

In the statistics department, Georgetown compiled a respectable 251 and a half yards in total offense, of which Lockwood accumulated all but 100 of. That broke down to 20, 71, 44.5 and 116 in the team's four periods. They had one quarterback sack, two fumble recoveries and two behind the opposing line tackles,
