The Great Salmon Contest may be over, but not the fishing. There were over \$135,000 in prizes awarded on Saturday at Port Credit Memorial Park, and still the fish come in to shore. While crossing the bridge over the Credit to view the awards, my wife and I watched one man catch a salmon under the bridge.

John Dolan of radio station C.F.R.B. was master of ceremonies along with Mark Horsburgh of Labatt's, introducing such top names from the ranks of the organizers: as Don McDonnell and Wayne Andrews who skippered the fleet ship Starship 1; Brian Evey, the contest organizer; Terry Taggart of the Toronto Star; Pat Patterson of Mercury Marine; Al Porspang of Mitchell fishing tackle, and John Power of the Toronto Star.

When it is considered that there were over 10,000 entrants, that's right, "ten thousand entries" in the GREAT SALMON HUNT, and each represents at least one fish and often many more than that number, it can be seen how important the Salmon fishery is on Lake Ontario.

Both he and Mayor McCallum got long and loud applause for their respective revelations.

The fishing had been poor for the last week of the GREAT SALMON HUNT and there had been no changes in the last two weeks of the contest. However there is still lots of fishing to go as the fish are now running up the rivers and there is evidence of a new school now coming in to shore to excite the charter boats fishermen. Smokers defending three titles No one favoured in flag football playoff running

The flag football playoffs open on four fronts this Sunday morning and for the first time in the league's four year history there is no clear cut favorite. The obvious conclusion is that on November 2 the two teams that finished tied for top spot, Delrex Smoke Shop and Wimpy's, will meet to decide the championship. That's the obvious conclusion but perhaps not the right one.

This Sunday at 8:45 (yawn) Wimpy's kicks off its title quest against the last place Halton Hogs. It is doubtful that even an outstanding game from all the Hog players, and especially their leading scorer Bill Allison, could prevent Wimpy's from advancing.

Wimpy's have been essentially intact as a team for three years and have the tools to go all the way. While their offense isn't fast, it is potent, and their defence is far and away the league's best, allowing just over 13 points per game. The only question mark for Wimpy's is at quarterback where John Clark missed the season's last two games because of injuries. Even without him they should easily handle the Hogs Wimpy's by sixties.

SMOKERS AND GLEN
At 10:00 a.m. the Smoke Shop begins its fourth consecutive title defence against the Glen. The Glen's strong showing against Wimpy's in

the season's final game, and their play against the Smokers in their last meeting with them live visions of an upset victory in their heads. But, barring a complete collapse by the Smokers, it should be nothing more than a vision.

The Glen have a solid defence led by the back field work of Bill Fourner, but they don't have the offense to keep pace with the Smokers who had the league's best offensive average. That, together with a strong defence and loads of playoff experience should make them too much for the Glen.

Big game by the Glen's spark plugs Ron Williams and Bob Paul should make it close. Smoke Shop by 10.

DQ AND FOBERTS
At 11:15 last year's finalists the Dairy Queen take on one of the league's most improved teams, Foberts.

For the second year in a row, Dairy Queen's Jeff Lockwood emerged as the scoring leader, this year in a runaway by 40 points over the nearest follower. He alone should give the DQ an edge. DQ also has a solid supporting cast made up of playoff veterans.

Foberts' hopes, on the other hand, rest on Terry Hunt, Brian Pemberton, Keith Peacock and Dave McCarthy. If quarterback Hunt can consistently hit one of the latter three receivers, they have the potential to put points on the board. Their defense is their major

weakness though and is weak on its good days. This more than anything should preclude a Fobert upset.

DAVE'S BP AND GREEKS
At 12:00 what should be the day's best game goes between Dave's BP and the Greek's Tavern. The Greek's charged hard during the early part of the season but played only 500 ball in their last ten games.

This team has abundant speed and talent, primarily in the persons of quarterback James Allan, John Karolidis and Rick Fisher. Their biggest problem is that after building up an early 4-4 record they spent the rest of the season convinced they were the class of the league. Consequently they are the team everyone loves to beat and have dropped four of their last seven. If they stick to football they can be devastating.

The BP has never quite lived up to the occasional flashes of brilliance they sometimes show. In their last outing they knocked off the Greeks and it couldn't have come at a better time.

On a good day these guys can beat anyone and behind the excellent passing of Jim McGill they will be tough Sunday. Look for a big game from BP's Paul Egerton and Scott Mason. If the opening round produces an upset this will be it. Dave's BP by three.
