## Region hunts a new director

The resignation of business development Director Bill Marshall last week has sent the region on another hunt to fill a top administrative position.

Mr. Marshall, who resigned last week to accept the general manager's position with the industrial and commercial development corporation of the region of Ottawa-Carleton, told the press that his leaving had nothing to do with the region's deficit issue. A \$600,000 gap in the Halton's operating budget was discovered last July.

Despite some disagreement among councillors, the region voted to begin an immediate advertising campaign to fill the vacant position.

Regional chairman Jack Ruffis told council that it is important to find someone for the position quickly because the job is "tremendously important."

But Burlington Councillor Jim Grieve felt that finding a professional to replace Mr. Marshall should be a carefully-made decision and recommended that the matter be referred back to the administration and finance committee for consultation.

In describing the role of Halton's business development director, Mr. Marshall told council to look for a candidate with Bachelor of Commerce degree and at least two years experience in developing commercial and industrial busi-

ness, especially with another regional organization.

## Morrow slams regional move on sewer rates

Former Halton region chairman Rick Morrow has termed a move to return regional control of water and sewer rates to local municipalities as "short-sighted, parochial and lacking in any depth of understanding of what regional government is all about."

Mr. Morrow, who was credited with placating angry councillors from the rest of the region during battles to establish the single regional rate, nursed the concept of a regional rate for water and sewers throughout his term of office and retired in 1978 with the sewer surcharge in place and equalized water rates approved in principle.

Regional councillors on the sewer surcharge committee passed recommendations Monday that "effective January 1, 1981, all sewer costs, including year-end balances, be apportioned to the area municipalities on a charge back basis," and that with the consent of the province, the unexpended 1981 and 1982 special assistance sewage grant, totalling \$684,000, be assigned to Halton Hills. They also want regional billing agencies to eliminate sewer surcharge for all bills issued after Jan. 1.

Mr. Morrow said if the region decided to back out of its commitment to regional water and sewer rates, the province would probably want their money refunded from special incentive grants the region received when it went into the system. Those grants totalled more than \$1 million on sewers and an additional sum for which he would not quote figures on water. Raising the funds to return this money would impose quite a burden on local taxpayers, he said.

Mr. Morrow said those who knock regional government don't seem to understand that all the essential services, except fire protection, are provided by the region. Setting different rates for these services is like setting different federal income tax rates across Canada.

Continued from page A1. ment demonstrations. Canteens were opened by St. Pauls Anglican Church in Norval, the Georgetown Figure Skating Club, the Optimists and the Women's Institute, while the Elks Club took care of displays in the Armory and the Lion's Club manned the gates.

Cattle shows, horse shows and a ponyrama in the morning maintained the agricultural flavor of the fair, and Saturday afternoon, spectators at the horse draws were entertained by Iva and the Country Gents, a bluegrass-country music quartet from Brampton. Mr. Morrow said the region is served by some councillors who not only lack understanding of the basic principles of regional government, but who actively oppose it.

This is the result of having regional councillors who serve a dual role, he said. A report he wrote during his first term as regional chairman called for the election of regional councillors who dealt only with the region and didn't sit on local council. If this were the case, regional councillors would be dedicated to making the region work and would be elected on regional issues rather than on local ones as is now the case.

Mr. Morrow also feels mayors have no place on the regional council. It's like asking the prime minister to run parliament with the provincial premiers present, he said. It just doesn't work well.

He also feels the regional chairman should be elected like any other official rather than elected by his fellow councillors as happens now.

If the region starts handing back sewer and water to the local municipalities, other services will follow and soon the region won't be providing any services across the region, he warns.

Continued from page A1. the Niagara Escarpment plan, he suspects. These, coupled with laxer controls in the proposed pits and quarries legislation, would allow them to carry on as they see fit.

If the Halton plan is quashed until the aggregate act is passed, the OMB will have to keep the government policies in mind in recommending changes to the plan. The solicitor, also acting chief administrative officer for the region, pointed to great changes in the Durham official plan and said he felt the aggregate group's aim is to force similar changes in Halton.
