Just remember to fish S-L-O-W and easy with wind drifting an excellent method if it is not too

Minnows are a good bet and this is when the fly fisherman can get in his licks with Bass and Walleyes using a weighted streamer fished slow and on bottom.

Look for the deepest weed growth and under-water humps and islands. Here you will find bass, and in walleye lakes the fish will be feeding all day instead of just at night. Next week a little on preparing your eatch for freezing and a forward look to the ice fishing season. See you next week


