You can hunt Canada Geese

Further to the prizes of the Great Salmon Hunt, that concluded recently, the grand prize winner, Don Hubbard of Oshawa won a 1980 Jeep Cherokee. With it went a 20 foot Wilker with convertible top, trailer, and everything that you would need to outfit a boat for the absolute best in fishing. Total value \$40,000.

The draw prize was for anyone who entered a Coho in the contest, regardless of size and was won by Jerry Barrell of Port Colborne. The value was \$30,000 for an identical prize to the grand prize except smaller. This made his catch worth \$187.50 per ounce. Some fishing trip that was.

TOP CONTENDER
Kathy Potter, 11-years-old, was the top contender for quite a while. She finally ended up in second place with her 18.22 pound Coho and won an outboard motor worth \$12,000 and a surprise gift of a \$1,000 cheque toward a university education trust fund.

As the charter boat skippers play such a large role in the salmon fishery on Lake Ontario, a special prize was made up for the largest Coho Salmon taken on a charter boat. The client that took the prize and the skipper headed to Alaska's Kenai River, and gusted on the Red Fisher Show.

The winner was Bob Ralston of Rexdale and the skipper Ken Cohen of the charter boat El Condor.
Also winning in the Great Salmon Hunt's other fish classes were: Terry Cosgrove with a 21.10 pound Rainbow Trout; Joe Farnell with a 33.54 pound Chinook salmon; John Slagle with a 9.02 pound Brown Trout and Ray Klimtack with a 8.76 pound Lake Trout.

Each of these men won a Lund Boat, motor and trailer. In addition 240 weekly (40 per week) prizes were awarded six times. Can't wait for next year's contest.

HUNT CANADA GEESE
Canada Geese are numerous this fall, and the hunting opportunities are plentiful. Reports indicate the number of ducks and geese already bagged by hunters is up over last year's total, and the season will hold good, although expect bad weather to send the birds on their way early this year.
This is my prediction and no one else's, but I feel that the winter will set in soon and be a relatively bad one with lots of snow.

Grouse will improve as the leaves drop, in the next couple of weeks, and the birds are more visible to the hunter.
Small game forecast: Squirrels are fat and sassy and in good supply. If you have never eaten this fine game animal, then better do it this year, you will never regret it. Rabbit numbers are up as are racoon and if the sportsman can keep away from the good hunting this fall then he can enjoy the top flight fishing opportunities. Just remember to fish S-L-O-W and easy with wind drifting an excellent method if it is not too fast.

Minnows are a good bet and this is when the fly fisherman can get in his licks with Bass and Walleyes using a weighted streamer fished slow and on bottom.

Look for the deepest weed growth and under-water humps and islands. Here you will find bass, and in walleye lakes the fish will be feeding all day instead of just at night.

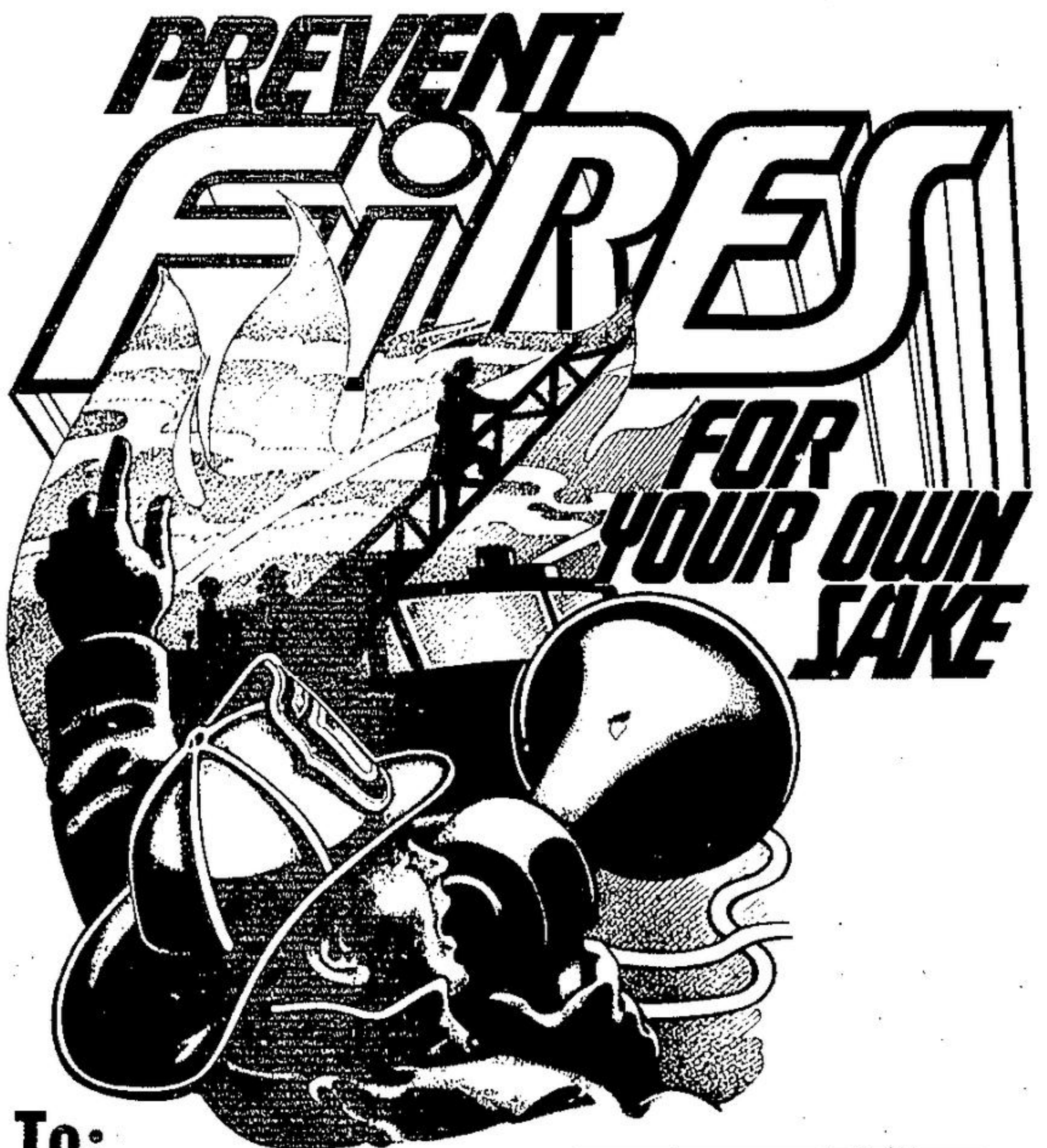
