Junior Miss pageant deemed a success

Barrett readies for 1981 Fall Fair, urges others to offer assistance

While he might be breathing a little easier now that the whole thing is finished, Jim Barrett, organizer of the controversial Junior Miss Halton Hills beauty pageant, says he's willing to do it again next year, with twice as many girls.

Miss Dan's Auto, four-year-old Leslie Ann Staddon became the first name on the competition's Akers and Clark winners' trophy. R and R Variety store's Krista Robertson, 4, was named the first runner up and Amy Adams, Angela Campbell, Kelly Campbell, Tara Hamilton, Bobbi Presswood, Jackie Land and Trisha Himenisji followed close thirds.

"All in all, I think it went over very well," Mr. Barrett said in the aftermath of the event held Saturday at the Georgetown Fall Fair. "I was very happy when I got on stage and saw all the people."

Mr. Barrett, who estimates that between 250 to 300 people showed up to support the nine girls aged between three to five years, admitted that he was nervous just before the show started because of the venomous reaction of the "Junior Miss" idea aroused when it was first announced to the public seven weeks ago.

"You could feel the tension in the air," he said. "But when the first girl came on and made everybody laugh, the tension just dissipated. The girls were so natural."

Mr. Barrett told The Herald Sunday that he had received 25 supportive calls from people who had watched the pageant, and that adverse comments had been few, mostly from

people commenting in "on-the-street" interviews conducted at the Georgetown plaza for CHCH-TV's Tom Cherrington show. Mr. Barrett was scheduled to appear in this morning's (Wednesday's) broadcast of the program at 9:00 a.m., along with other highlights of the pageant.

In an abbreviated version of what older girls usually go through when competing in a beauty contest, the Junior Miss' danced, twirled, bled or sang for the panel of judges-Brampton-Georgetown MP John McDermaid, former Liberal MP Ross Milne, MPP Julian Reed and Fall Fair publicity person, Betty Ann Wellstead.

"I think we really showed the people of Georgetown that our children are the beauty of our community," Mr. Barrett said, adding that the judges and master of ceremonies Blake Stansfield indicated they would be interested in returning next year.

Safes cut down on burglaries alarm manufacturer says

Millions of dollars-worth of jewelry and other valuables might well have been saved if there had been a safe in each of the 185,000 homes burglarized in Canada last year, says a spokesman from Chubb Industries Ltd., the largest safe manufacturer in Canada.

There has been a sizeable increase in the number of residential burglaries," says Mike West, Marketing Manager for Chubb. "A safe offers an additional and unique barrier to the housebreaker, therefore, his purpose - to steal your valuables - is more difficult and the chance of you retaining the contents of the safe are considerably improved."

What kind of safe is best?

Any type of safe will offer a degree of resistance to physical attack and will reduce the risk of loss. But physical attack is not the only hazard to the safe. If it is not heavy enough or securely anchored down, it becomes a convenient carrying case for the criminal. You not only lose the contents but the safe as well.

The first consideration, therefore, is to buy either a safe weighing enough that even two men will have extreme difficulty moving it, or if it's lighter than this, anchor it down. For instance if the safe has wheels, make a wooden framework (covering as wide an area as practical) around the base of the unit and fill this

with concrete, deep enough to firmly embed the wheels.

The second thing to consider relates to the amount of resistance the safe will provide against forced entry. Granted the average housebreaker is not a professional safecracker; nevertheless, most homes contain tools like hammers, sledges, crowbars and axes that can be used to "crack" a safe. Therefore, something better than a tin box, even if it has a combination lock, is needed if the safe is going to withstand any reasonable amount of amateur pounding and prying.

A very popular home safe is the type sold under the "Chubb On Guard" brand by major hardware stores for about \$250. This safe is principally designed to protect its contents against fire but the features that make it fire-resistant, such as a thick steel-covered body and door, with a heavy locking bolt, also make it

suitable as a burglar-resistant unit for use in many homes.

It should be noted that this theft protection only applies for home use. Retail stores attract professional safecrackers, and the \$250 fire resistant safe cannot be expected to offer sufficient protection.

Commercial safes for homes.

Some more affluent citizens may need a commercial quality safe. Expensive jewelry and other valuables kept in the home can be a target for the professional burglar. He will come prepared, and the type of safe used to contain a quantity of expensive jewelry must be designed to resist his more determined professional efforts.

The extra protection the safe provides will be reflected in its cost. "There is a growing demand for top quality commercial safes in homes," says Mr. West. "Sales of burglar-resistant safes in the \$1,000

Of course, no home safe, no matter at what price, can equal the security of a bank vault with a sophisticated alarm system, where a safe deposit box can be rented for pennies a day. But jewelry is meant to be worn, not tucked away in a remote albeit safe location.

"And an ever-increasing number of people prefer to depend on a safe together with adequate insurance coverage," says Mr. West, "even though at this point in time no insurance company will give a discount on premiums because the policy holder has a safe in his house."
