Fire prevention week needed year-round

This week (Oct. 5-11) is Fire Prevention Week in Canada and the Halton Fire Departments are celebrating the occasion with special programs designed to make the public more aware of the dangers of fire. Public education is the main part of the week.

But Capt. Art McGlynn of Burlington, Chairman of Halton Region Fire Prevention Committee, feels EVERY week should be Fire Prevention Week. "Prevention of fire is a year-round job, not just for our firefighters but for every man, woman and child in Halton," he said.

"A special week and a little extra promotion don't go amiss, but truthfully - every day has to be fire prevention day before we can effectively reduce the staggering toll of fire in Halton."

Capt. McGlynn cited 1979 statistics on fires, gathered from the four Halton fire departments (Oakville, Halton Hills, Milton and Burlington). There were 3,313 fire calls registered in 1979. Of those, 385 were calls to fires in residential buildings (homes and apartments). Fire left a \$3,660,000 toll in Halton last year, which means it cost every resident of Halton about \$18.

Fire also claimed four lives and injured 50 people in Halton last year.

"It's a tragic toll - not just the lives and injuries, but the dollars too," said the Fire

Masks available for cold weather

The Halton Lung Association announced today that it will be making available to the public, face masks to be worn in cold weather for those who experience difficulty in breathing.

Dr. R.W.T. Haddon of Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital, Medical Director of the Family Asthma Programs and Better Breathing Classes, advised that the "Cold Weather Masks" were devised to prevent the onset of bronchospasm as a result of breathing very cold air. The patient wears this mask as he leaves home and is able to inhale, through a corrugated tube, air which has been warmed by his own body. The use of a one way valve enables the patient to always receive fresh warm air each inhalation as well as eliminate carbon dioxide upon exhalation.

Cold Weather Masks can be obtained from the Halton Lung Association at a cost of \$2.50.

Halton Region Fire Prevention Committee co-ordinates regional fire prevention programs and co-operates with local member fire departments on their year-round fire prevention efforts.

PROPOSED WASTE DISPOSAL SITE FOR LANDFILLING
Regional Municipality of Halton

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment has received an application by the Regional Municipality of Halton for approval of a proposed waste disposal site for landfilling to be located on Part of Lots 6 and 7, Concession VII, New Survey, Geographic Township of Nelson, County of Halton now in the Town of Milton, Regional Municipality of Halton, more particularly in Parts 1 to 5 inclusive, on Plan 20-R-4617 for Registry Division of Halton (20). The proposed site is known as Site "F".

The Environmental Assessment Board will conduct a public hearing to obtain information and to hear the views of the public so that it can make recommendations in respect of the proposed waste disposal site. Written and oral submissions may be made to the Board at the hearing. The Board will not consider any submissions regarding the proposal after the hearing has been closed.

The hearing will be held on October 15, 1980, at 10:00 o'clock in the morning, local time, in the Auditorium, Halton Centennial Manor, 185 Ontario Street South, Milton, Ontario.

Plans of the proposed waste disposal site will be available for examination and inspection during normal business hours in the office of the Clerk of the Regional Municipality of Halton, 1151 Bronte Road, Oakville, Ontario, in the office of the Clerk of the Town of Milton, 251 Main Street East, Milton, Ontario, and in the office of the Environmental Assessment Board, 5th Floor, 1 St. Clair Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario, M4V 1K7.
