Two Storey Home in the Grand Manner

This outstanding design with traditional exterior is perfectly suited to the wide frontage residential building lot and provides in excess of 2,100 square feet of finished floor area. It possesses a wide range of convenience features certain to please the larger family with discriminating tastes. The exterior details unite to create a tone of the large old-country provincial estates. The fieldstone veneer, dormer window and traditional shingle roof are complemented by the country-style entrance and garage doors, stone chimney and small-paned windows.

The weather-protected entrance leads into a compact reception foyer, from whence traffic moves naturally right into the large living-dining room combination. The living room features a centrally-positioned masonry fireplace flanked by full-width windows. The dining room extension features a built-in china cabinet and a convenient pocket door separating it from the kitchen.

The well-planned U-shape kitchen has excellent natural lighting, generous cupboard storage and a sloped-saving work triangle, and separates from the large family room via convenient snack bar counter. The family room connects to the rear deck via sliding glass doors for easy access to outdoor dining in fine weather. The large master bedroom is sunken down two risers from the hall level and has a full-width closet, dormer window alcove and a three-piece ensuite bathroom with a shower.

The central bathroom has an unusual and convenient layout in that the double vanity sinks and linen storage closet are separated from the tub and toilet proper via pocket door, extending the range of use of these facilities.

A full basement provides abundant room for the future development of a recreation room, wet bar and/or a home workshop for the handyman.
