Toronto Bureau Inmates at Ontario's correctional centres, including Maplehurst in Milton, enjoyed the true spirit of Thanksgiving last weekend.

Their Thanksgiving meal Monday consisted largely of food they grew and harvested themselves, said Correctional Services Minister Gord Walker.

800 ACRES Mr. Walker said this year, inmates farmed 800 acres of and across the province near their correctional centres. This included raising pigs and chickens. Breakfast eggs will come from the centres' poultry

Last year, inmates worked only 27 acres. In the future, inmates will be totally self-sufficient in the food department. However, this year, although not totally self-sufficient, inmates will "appreciate more the value of

the meal, knowing they have hoed the field, raked the weeds and produced the growth right from the planting of the seed," Mr. Walker said.

Inmates are now eating the food they've produced during the last six months on a regular basis, he said. This year's self-sufficiency program was so successful they have 200 tons of potatoes left over, Mr. Walker said.

TRADING "We're trading them with the feds for carrots," he said. The ministry has not gone into turkey production, so this year's turkeys were not raised by the inmates. However. chickens they raised could be used for future Thanksgivings.

Likewise, although the peas are canned, the inmates could move to growing and canning or freezing them in the future,

Inflation the issue: survey

Halton constituents don't think much of the federal governments' emphasis on the constitution, Halton MP Otto Jelinek says a survey of constituents shows.

Jelinek said in Oltawa that he sent a questionnaire to 35,000 households in the constituency and nearly 10 per cent gave replies.

Asked to list the most important issues in Canada, 47.1 per cent said inflation was the most important; 14.3 per cent said energy; nine per cent said unemployment; 8.1 per cent said law and order; 3.5 per cent said the constitution; 1.2 per cent said interest rates; and 0.2 per cent said bilingual-

Jelinek said 83.1 per cent of those answering questions about the constitution said the British North America (BNA) Act should be brought to Canada.

Asked about amending the constitution 75.4 per cent said amendments should be made by the federal and provincial governments and 32 per cent by the federal government

On the question of federal and provincial powers 33.6 per cent said they were in favor of the present distribution of federal and provincial powers and 57.3 per cent said they were not in favor.

Of those not in favor of the present distribution, 51.2 per cent thought the federal government should have more power, and 44.4 per cent thought provincial government should have more power.

Jelinek said most who replied to the questionnaire were disturbed or even angered that the constitution is being considered at this time.




