## School's enhanced status evidence ot grads' success

Georgetown District High School bid congratulations and farewell Saturday to a graduating class that, by all accounts, deserves most of the credit for giving GDHS regional, provincial and even national prominence among Canadian schools that have recorded high academic and athletic achievements.

More than 450 of last year's Grades 12 and 13 students returned to their alma mater for a three-hour afternoon commencement ceremony witnessed by relatives, friends and faculty who jammed the school's cafetorium,

Highlighting the exercise were complementary addresses from principal Michael Furlong and Grade 13 valedictorian Helen Kristensen, both of whom offered humorous anecdotes from the past five years involving teachers and students, while at the same time firmly testifying to the school's increasingly important status among other Ontario high schools.

Mr. Furlong cited a lengthy list of recent achievements by GDHS students in both scholastic and athletic programs to urge the graduates to maintain pride in their old school. All too often, he complained in impassioned and emotional terms, the public outside the school over-reacts to negative and media reports on problems within the school. Despite their general ignorance of the school's workings, he said, detractors seize upon isolated evidence of drug abuse, vandalism and other problems to criticize its administration and teaching

methods. The principal's purposefully ad-libbed speech gave further credence to the exemplary school spirit nurtured by students and faculty over the past five years. The greatlyenhanced rapport bonding graduates and their former teachers was evident Saturday

to all outsiders. "This school's got a lot of heart," John Bradley of the Halton Board of Education acknowledged, joining Mr. Furlong and Miss Kristensen in applauding numerous school nchievements, including most recently the GDHS Terry Fox Day, during which a majority of school staff, faculty and student body members took to the outdoor track to raise more funds for the Marathon of Hope cancer fighter.

Miss Kristensen's valedictory address (see excerpts this page) alternated between humorous reminders of former teachers' habits - MIss Harrison's impulsive shaking of front-row desks in response to wrong answers from the back of her French class or Miss Gooding's portrayal of the sugarplum fairy in a teacher's Christmas play - and sincere respect paid the facility which gave her and her classmates

"an education in life". Georgetown artist and historian Dorothy Stone shared her own witty recollections of school days when she presented the original GDHS handbell in a re-enactment of the presentation made to the Halton school board earlier this year.

Purchased for the newlybuilt Georgetown high school in 1887, the large handbell was salvaged by Col. Gordon Brown when the structure was demolished in 1959 to make way for the existing school. Col. Brown, then secretarytreasurer of the old Georgetown school board, gave the bell to Miss Stone for safekeep-

The invocation for the commencement was offered by Pastor A.J. Nicholson'. GDHS music teacher Harry Hamilton earned a special round of applause after leading the school band through several pieces, including a medley arrangement from Jesus Christ, Superstar and the song


