

Malcolmson wins Kin award

Nine members of the Kinsmen Club of Georgetown were among delegates attending the organization's District 8 Fall Council Friday and Saturday in Collingwood.

Club president Don Pearson, past president Bob Malcolmson, first vice president Bruce

Gougeon, second vice-president Rick Crawford, treasurer Don Smith, registrar Rick Armstrong, cystic fibrosis campaign chairman Dave Hogan and members Ted Savage and Pete Werton joined fellow Kinsmen from as far away as Wawa, Ontario,

and Val D'Or, Quebec for the annual fall council hosted by the Markham club. Among the presentations made were the national awards for last year's Outstanding Presidents, for which District 8 saw 17 of its 81 presidents qualify. George-

town past president Bob Malcolmson was one of the 17 presidents to receive this award, recognizing the clubs' outstanding community service efforts over the past Kin year.

The meeting enables Kinsmen from throughout the District to exchange service and fund-raising ideas. As well, they heard directors of Ronald McDonald House in Toronto request organization's support in this worthwhile project. The National Executive, represented by past national president John Green, put forth the 1980-81 International Relations Project. During the upcoming year, Kinsmen from across Canada have pledged to raise \$34,000 for the Changa Rural Health Centre in Zambia and \$9,000 for the Apiem Kindergarten for the Mentally Handicapped Children in Mauritius, South Africa.

The 1979-80 Cystic Fibrosis Financial Statement was approved by the council. During the past year, District 8 Kinsmen raised over \$228,000, of which the Georgetown club donated \$4,600 in the fight against this crippling children's disease. Nationally, Kinsmen raised more than \$600,000 to fight Cystic Fibrosis.

Georgetown Kinsmen thank all those who support them in their projects to enable them to participate in such worthwhile projects.

The buses, which no longer park at the Moore Park Plaza, are looking for a suitable location near businesses to stop for periods of up to an hour.

But at the town's general committee meeting last Tuesday, Mayor Pete Pomeroy said that Main Street bus parking might be bothersome to some of the store owners, who prefer to keep the off-street parking area open for customers.

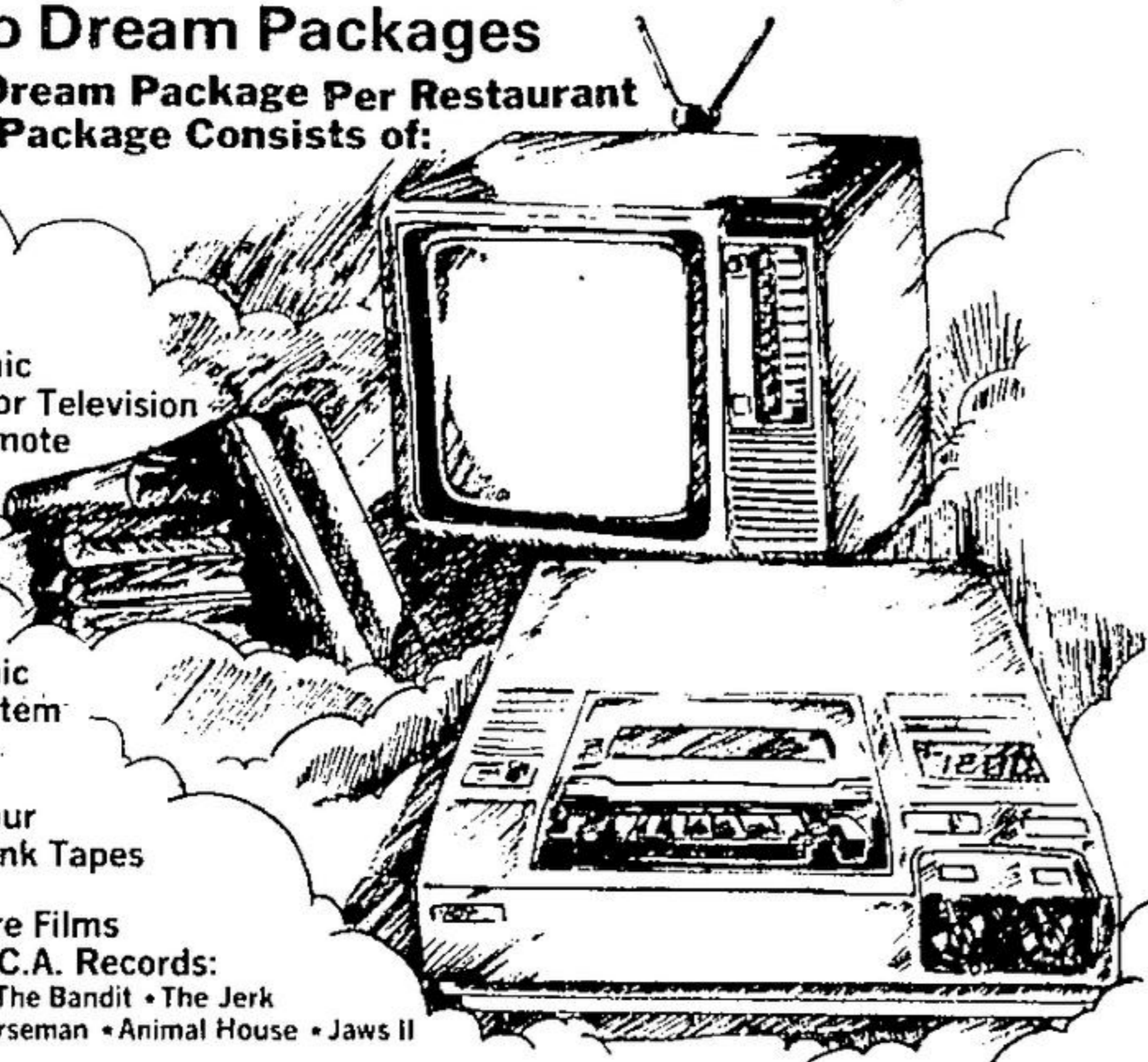
