Climber's death concerns HRCA

The Halton Region Conservation Authority is at a loss as to what steps is could take to stop inexperienced climbers from scaling the rock cliffs along the Niagara Escarpment in Milton in the wake of the third fatality there in the past three years. Authority officials discussed the Oct. 20 death of 15-year old Wesley Marsden of Burlington at their meeting last week, but admitted there is nothing they can do to prevent other climbers from risking their lives along the craggy precipices of Kelso Bluff and Rattlesnake Point. The Authority is still studying the possibility of organizing weekend patrols, a move recommended by a coroner's jury investigating a 1979 death, but points out that the amount of climbing through the week does not warrant weekday patrols. Warning signs are posted along the bluffs. Coroner Ivan Hunter is awaiting a regional police report on last week's death before deciding whether another inquest will be held. Mr. Marsden's fall was the third serious climbing accident to take place on Authority property in the last six months, and the third death in three years.
