Last week it was mentioned about pensions. The changes are as follows: First World War veterans who served in the U.K. for less than 365 days did not receive any allowances. This restriction has now been changed.

The main changes are widows and children (dependents) of disability pensioners who received less than 48 percent, received nothing; now they are entitled to a monthly pension on a sliding scale down to five per cent. This will be scheduled to begin Oct. 1, 1980, for those who were in the 38 per cent to 47 per cent. Then every April 1 of each year the percentage will be added until everyone is covered to the extent of the changes: approximately six years.




Trinity United Church — MIII Street East (Acton)
