Raiders look sharp after 3 wins

A grueling, three-game weekend sweep has given the Georgetown Raiders an early chance at a play-off spot, but Raider coach Gerry Inglis says he's not sure if he has the team he needs for a Hardy Cup victory next spring.

"I don't think we could win the Hardy Cup with what we've got now," he said following Georgetown's 7-3 home ice romp over the Collingwood Shipbuilders Saturday night. Tough guys and players who can spark the team are needed, he said, to grab the championship, which the undefeated Owen Sound Greys are also drooling after.

Returning home after handing the Midland Athletics another 13-4 defeat Friday night—the hapless Athletics suffered similar humiliation the week before at Alcott arena—the Raiders played neck-to-neck hockey with the fourth place Shipbuilders before finally pulling ahead in third period to clinch a victory.

Coach Inglis praised the goalkeeping efforts of Peter McDuffe for holding the fourth place Shipbuilders at bay. "McDuffe seems to be taking away the angles a little more and he's controlling the puck better," Inglis said.

Collingwood opened the scoring just past the one minute mark of the first period as Doug Kerr picked up a pass from team-mate Myles McCauley and scooped it past McDuffe. Raider's John Cook picked up his first of three goals against Collingwood netminder Ron Twiss on a passing play from Ron Twiss and Rick Kessell to tie the game at 16:25.

Bill Lecke moved the Shipbuilders ahead again early in the second period, but Dan Eastman, dressed for his first formal appearance with the Raiders, made it 2-2 at the midway mark, picking up a pass from team-mates Ray Tonelli and Ed Huizingh.

The Collingwood squad refused to sink before the third period, and moved ahead once more at 16:31 as George Wilson and Larry Coe fed Steve McAleese for the Shipbuilders' third point. The Raiders came from behind with 48 seconds remaining in the second period as Ron Twiss connected on a scoring play from Bruce Ellison and Cook.

The Raiders sent the Shipbuilders to the bottom in hockey

period with four unanswered goals, including a three-goal barrage in the final two minutes of play.

John Cook picked up his second goal of the game at the 8:37 mark of the period to unleash the Raider scoring flurry. Ray Tonelli followed with less than two minutes remaining in the game to connect on a passing sequence organized by newly named captain Juri Kudrasovs and

Gary Landry. Joe Ens fed Cook for the hat-trick point at 18:19 and Al Woods added insult to injury, picking up a goal with 23 seconds left on a pass from Cook and Colin Gordon.

Despite Collingwood's loss, Inglis said he felt they put up a good fight.

"They play good positional hockey," he said, adding that while his own club is still "thin" on defence "the guys

we've got played well for us."

Raiders Ron Ellison and Gary McFayden each collected hat-tricks during the 13-4 pummeling which the Athletics embarrassingly had suffered on home ice in Midland Friday night. It proved a big night for Ron Twiss as well, who returned home with five points including two goals. Al Woods, Joe Ens and Gary Ford also proved effective point-getters for the Raiders. Terry Spiker, Wayne King, Ross Cousineau and Ross Prentice scored for the Athletics.

Steve Lyon and Gary McFayden picked up two goals a piece in the Raiders 5-3 victory over the Port Elgin Sunoco's Sunday. McFayden's first goal came while the visiting Raiders were short-handed

with Al Woods browsing in the penalty box for high sticking. Colin Gordon, Rick Kessell and Juri Kudrasovs also picked up single goals for the Raiders, topping home team tallies by Murray Cobean, Glen Morningstar and Claude Foy.

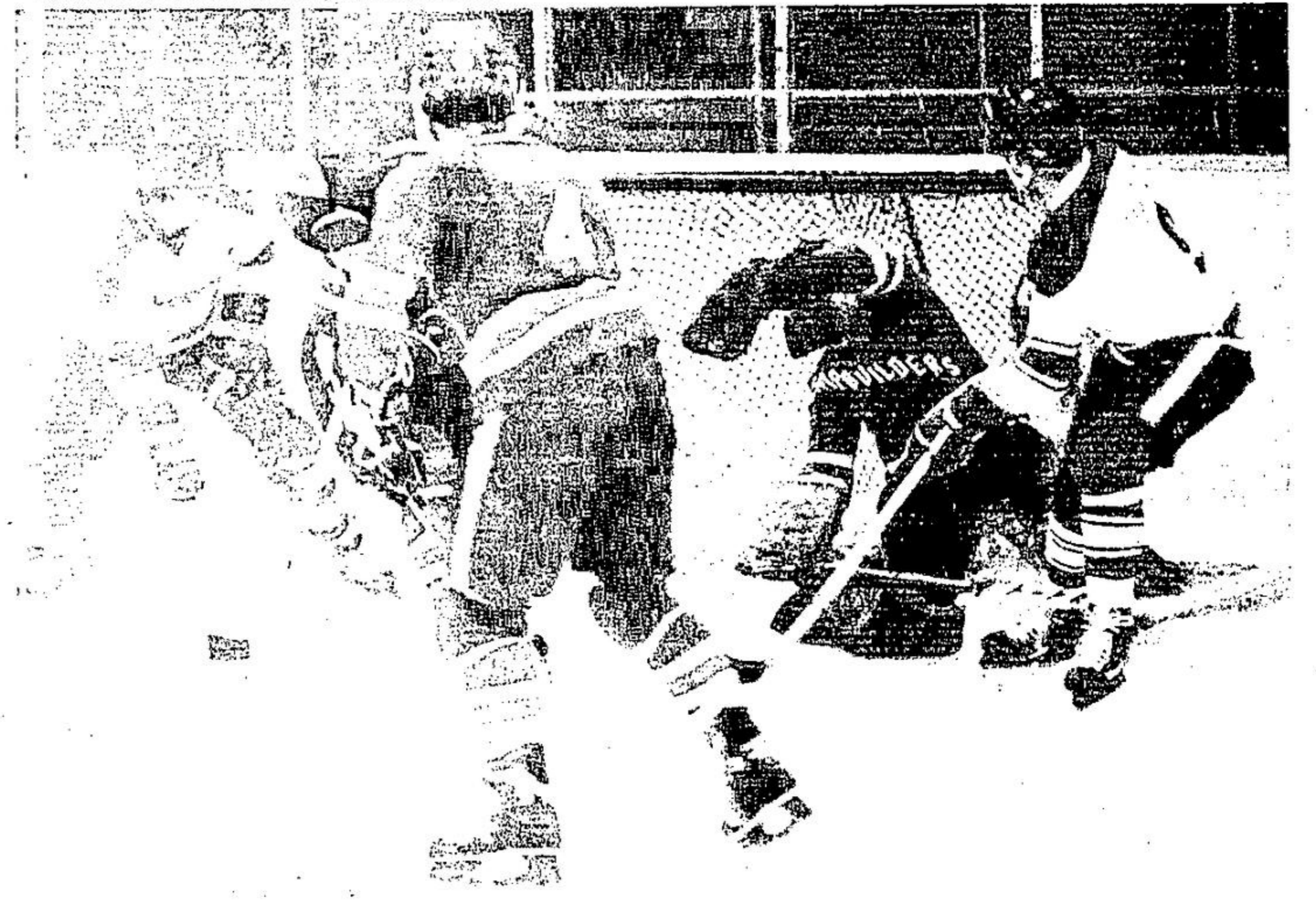
The Raiders weekend victories move them into first place with six wins, one loss and one tie for a 13 point total.

But the club is closely dogged by the Owen Sound Greys, who, with three games in hand thanks to a relatively light early season schedule, are following with nine points on a four wins, one tie record.

The Greys will be in town this Friday clashing with their Georgetown rivals in what promises to be a barn burner of a hockey game.

Rebels race toward provincial finals in cross country

The GDHS Cross Country team proved superior once again when they captured the overall team title for the annual Peel-Halton championships last Wednesday at Heart Lake.

As well, Georgetown claimed titles in five of the six divisions. These were the midget, junior and senior girls and midget and senior boys. The junior boys earned second place behind a tough (but not invincible) Chinguacousy team.

The first and second place teams for each division at this meet go on to OFSAA.

ALL SIX TEAMS
Georgetown therefore qualified all six of its teams to the provincials and hence made up half of the teams that can qualify.

Not surprisingly, the Rebels won the overall girls and overall boys titles at the Peel-Halton meet.

Donna Metcalfe, who coaches the team with Karen Cosgrove, remarked that the course was flatter than what the team was used to running on. This makes the race easier for those who excel in track to win. The Georgetown team's supreme strength on hills could not therefore be used to an advantage.

DISPLAYED STRENGTH
The Rebels displayed their strength however, as they did win the championship. The team should do well at OFSAA, for the course is hilly throughout and some of the racers (depending on their division) will have to run up a truly gargantuan ski hill.

At the Halton Champion-

ships (Kelso) and Peel Championships (Heart Lake), each team had to narrow down to the top seven runners on each of their divisional teams. The top two teams from each division in Halton and top two teams from each division in Peel go on to the Peel-Halton championships, which alternate in location each year at Kelso and Heart Lake.

FIRST FIVE
The first five runners on each team from each division at the Peel-Halton's go on to the OFSAA championships, providing that divisional team places first or second in that division. The sixth runner on each team is the substitute.

As well, the first ten runners to cross the line in each race who are not in the top five of the first and second place teams, will run at OFSAA.

Georgetown therefore qualified six teams (30 runners) to the provincial championships. Kim Newcombe made it an unprecedented 31 runners, as she was the sixth Georgetown member to finish in the junior girls' race placing ninth.

WANTS FIRST
Among those who should receive special recognition for their achievements is Paul Watts, who was the only individual winner on the Georgetown team when he placed first in the midget boys' race.

Lynn Macphail was second in the midget girls' race, and Sandra Marciniuk earned second position, as well, in the junior girls' race.

The senior boys' race had Doug Smith placing second behind Roy Puloni of Milton. Leanne Grasby came sixth, to teammate Lynn's second in

the midget girls' race. Among others, they were followed by Barb Gage, tenth, and Karen Edgar, 11th. The team's score (calculated by adding the positions of the first four runners) totalled 29. Five of the six Rebel team scores were in the 20's.

LOWEST TOTAL
The lowest total of the day, 20 points, came with Georgetown's junior girls' win.

Behind Marciniuk in that race came Sherry Finucan, Liz Ramsay, Susan Kristensen, Debbie Newman and Kim Newcombe in fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth positions respectively. Cheryl Thompson came in for a strong 12th place finish. Since Newcombe qualified individually for OFSAA, Thompson is now the substitute.

Fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh positions went to Kathy Webb, Heather McLaren, Diane Jones and Heather Reed in the senior girls' race. This team had the second lowest Rebel total of the day with only 22 points.

Following Watts in the midget boys' race were Chris Ferguson, fifth, Gary Hulbert, eighth, George Howie, tenth, Dave Banks, 17th and Doug Gillespie, 19th. The team finished with 24 points.

EZARD FIFTH
Mark Ezard led the way in the junior boys' race, placing fifth. Behind him, came Dave Griffiths, in seventh position, Harald Bransch, in 14th, Jack Harlow, 19th and Scott Harris, placing 22nd. The team's total was 45, nine points behind the winner, Chinguacousy.

Positions of fourth, tenth, 12th and 21st went to John Warnock, Dale McGregor, Jim McIntyre and Glenn Britton, who followed Smith's second place finish in the senior boys' race. This Georgetown team finished with a score of 28 points.

Coach Metcalfe commented: "We expect to do well at OFSAA. We (the coaches) still think that we're the strongest team in the province overall. Our individual teams should do well on the tough courses."

PROVINCE STUNNED
Last year, the Georgetown team absolutely stunned the entire province when it won five of a possible six Ontario divisional team titles. This is an extremely rare occurrence, however, as the most titles a single team has ever previously won is two. The coaches agreed that this amazing feat will probably never be duplicated or surpassed by any team.

North Halton Sports Camp suffered their first loss of the season last week when they were defeated by Milton 3-1.

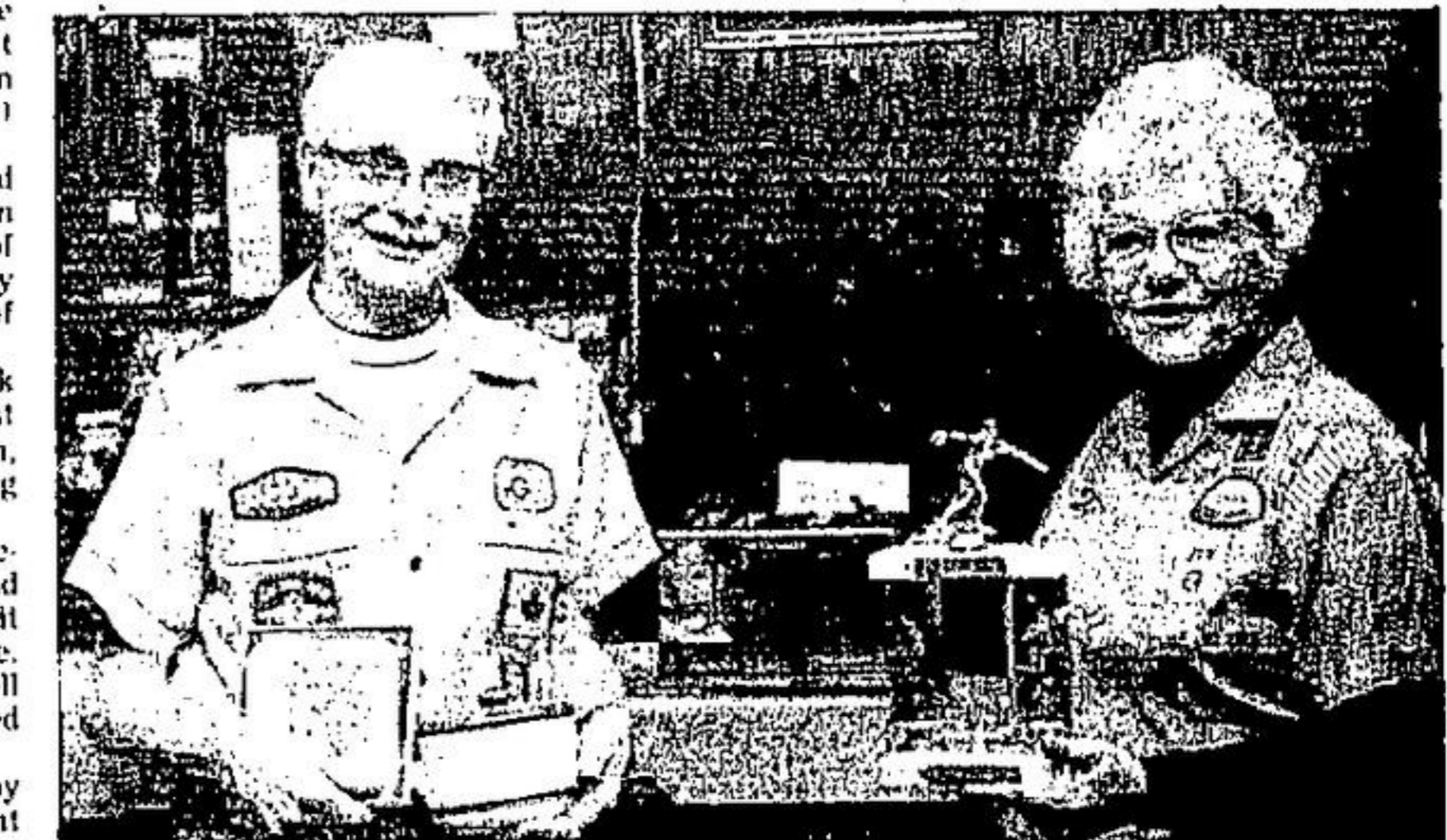
The Milton team displayed a well-balanced attack and supported their excellent goal-tending with strong defensive play.
