Overtime win in semi

Smoke Shop's 'finest hour'

The Delrex Smoke Shop has had many high points in its three-year reign as champion of the Georgetown Flag Football League, but it lived its finest hour this week. After 160 minutes of furious action, the Greeks and the Smoke Shop were tied. After 20 minutes of overtime, the Smokers had won the most dramatic, gut-wrenching football game either team ever played.

For the Smokers, it ended as it began, with their smallest player, Steve Harris, who turned out to be one of the most important men in a game of great plays, plucking the flag from Greek quarterback Ilick Baldwin after a desperate leap, just as Baldwin seemed sure to bring the Greeks back again.

The stars were almost too numerous to list, as each team reached back to produce a fantastic effort in the most abysmal conditions. There was the uncanny quarterbacking and leadership of Ilick Baldwin, the miraculous catches by Jim Baldwin and John Pritchard; Doug Getty's towering game on the Smoker

defense with three interceptions to go with one by Bob Sargent. And in the overtime, it was Bob Inglis keeping the Smokers alive with his ball control and another clutch grab by Terry Diardichuk for the winning score.

The game really defies description. If you saw it you were lucky, if you missed it, no words do it justice. Smoke Shop went in down by seven and scored first on a major by Werner Mikoleit. The convert was missed in the 50 m.p.h. winds and the Greeks roared back with a major by Mark Russell and 2 point conversion by John Pritchard. They increased their lead to seven-ten on a drive into the wind when Pritchard snared a Baldwin pass and James Allan added 2.

Just when it looked like curtains for Delrex, Inglis rallied the troops with two majors, one by Terry Diardichuk and one by Chris Sargent. Bruce Cartwright and John Vierra had 2 point conversions. The Smoke Shop had the only points in the third quarter with the wind in their favor. Sargent scored again and Jerry Neil caught a 2 pointer. Inglis had them knocking on

the door again as the quarter ended and scored in the early seconds of the fourth, this time to Werner Mikoleit with Diardichuk adding 2.

With time running out and down by 15 the Greeks were dead, but they wouldn't go down. In an astounding comeback they had the crowd in hysterics as they punched in two quick scores by Paul Wilson and Dean Scallen with Jim Baldwin converting one.

With three plays left in regulation time and the ball on their own 20, the Greeks trailed by one. Baldwin fired one pass complete to the 35 and another to midfield. From

there John Pritchard lofted a punt high into the swirling wind and it carried deep into the end zone for the single to send the match to overtime.

In a strategic gamble the Smokers elected to give the Greeks the wind advantage in the first of two ten minute overtime quarters. The strategy paid off as the defense held the Greeks to a 50-yard field goal attempt which hit the crossbar and bounced out. Then with the wind in their favor they put the winning points on the board as Terry Diardichuk scored and Neil converted to end this classic shootout 33-75 in total.

In the day's other match up

Wimpey's finally ran out of nerves against the no-nonsense Dairy Queen and could draw no closer than two points at any time.

The Wimps started well and did what they had to, scoring first on a 15 yd. strike to John Owen.

The DQ came right back however, when Steve Crossman, who had a big series against Wimpey's restored the 8 point bulge which Jeff Lockwood promptly increased to 9. Later in the quarter Lockwood added a field goal to signal the beginning of the end for Wimpey's.

In the second quarter the nerves started to show. Victor Koeh scored for Wimpey's and John Haliburton for DQ. Lockwood converted Dairy Queen's TD but the Wimps attempt was missed.

Wimpey's lost another point in the third quarter as the teams again traded majors but Wimpey's missed their convert. Hal Hulme had six for DQ and Lockwood one while Dave Warman scored for Wimpey's.

Wimpey's appeared deflated after they had an apparent interception taken away from them in the third quarter and it wasn't until the last five minutes when John Owen took over as quarterback, that they finally scored again. Owen hit Bob Morrow for a 12 yard TD but it was too little and far too late. Dairy Queen won the game 26-24 and the series 59-49.

So although the route to the final was very much tougher than last year, the same two teams will lock horns for the title. Dairy Queen and Smoke Shop have developed quite a rivalry over the past two seasons and neither team should hold many surprises for the other. The only questions to be answered are whether the Smokers have another big game left after their emotionally draining marathon with the Greeks, and whether the Dairy Queen can finally win the big one from the Smokers. It should be a good one and it goes at 11 a.m. this Sunday.
