UNICEF enlists Kermit the Frog in its annual Hallowe'en campaign

When thousands of children all over the United States knock on doors on Hallowe'en night, many of them will be under the leadership of Kermit the Frog of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) fund-raising campaign for 1980.

For the past 30 years, American children have been participating in "Trick or Treat for UNICEF," in order to help the international community of children less fortunate than they.

Along with the traditional shopping bag which they hope will be filled with Hallowe'en goodies, the children will also carry a cardboard bank which generous Americans have always filled with dimes, quarters and dollars.

And, who better to lead the troops than everyone's best friend and hero, Kermit the Frog. He follows in the footsteps of such well-known celebrities as Danny Kaye and Carroll O'Connor.

Jim Henson, the creator of Kermit and all the Muppets, says that the effort for UNICEF is the first fund-raising campaign in which Kermit or any of his characters have been involved. But Kermit's and Jim Henson's concern and affection for children make them natural for the part.



KERMIT THE FROG of the popular Muppets has been designated 1980 Chairman of the National UNICEF Day Hallowe'en Campaign. That's when, he explains, "people of all ages have fun helping the United Nations Children's Fund to make the lives of children in developing countries safer and happier."

UNICEF's projects range from building health centers to diagnose and combat disease, to providing food and vitamins for the malnourished. It currently serves as the lead agency for the United Nations' emergency relief campaign in Cambodia, and is also helping children and mothers affected by drought and

Free Toll Calls To Ontario MPPs

Province-wide toll free access to your local member of the Provincial Legislature is now available to all citizens of Ontario. This significant new development in Ontario's program to ensure that all citizens can contact key resources in Government at no charge, became effective October 1, Ontario Minister without Portfolio Alan Pope said. In June, the concept of toll

free access for constituents to their members, no matter where they live in the riding, was approved. Of the 125 members, 58 represent constituencies where long-distance calling is necessary in order to reach the constituency office. In each instance the member's telecommunication needs were analysed and discussed and the most appropriate and cost effective method was agreed upon.

Throw an autumn tailgating party

Do you know almost 49 million Americans attended professional and collegiate football games last year? That's one heck of a lot of beer, peanuts and frankfurters! As a kid, I can remember the fun of helping my mother plan pre-game tailgate parties for all the family friends, complete with picnic baskets, a checked tablecloth and pennants. It isn't difficult to arrange a fun-filled get-together before cheering on your favorite team, and it certainly makes a great weekend for all.

First, make sure you've purchased your tickets well before the day of the game. It's almost impossible to get a block of seats together at the last minute. And, who wants their friends scattered all over the stadium?

Next, compile a list of everything you'll need. Don't forget necessities such as salt and pepper shakers, serving spoons, a big blanket or tablecloth (sitting on cold ground can be cold!), napkins, a bottle opener and any other items which prove unavailable in a stadium parking lot. Don't forget the pigskin or a frisbee for pre-game exercise.

The picnic basket should be large enough to accommodate food, serving pieces, cutlery and beverages. 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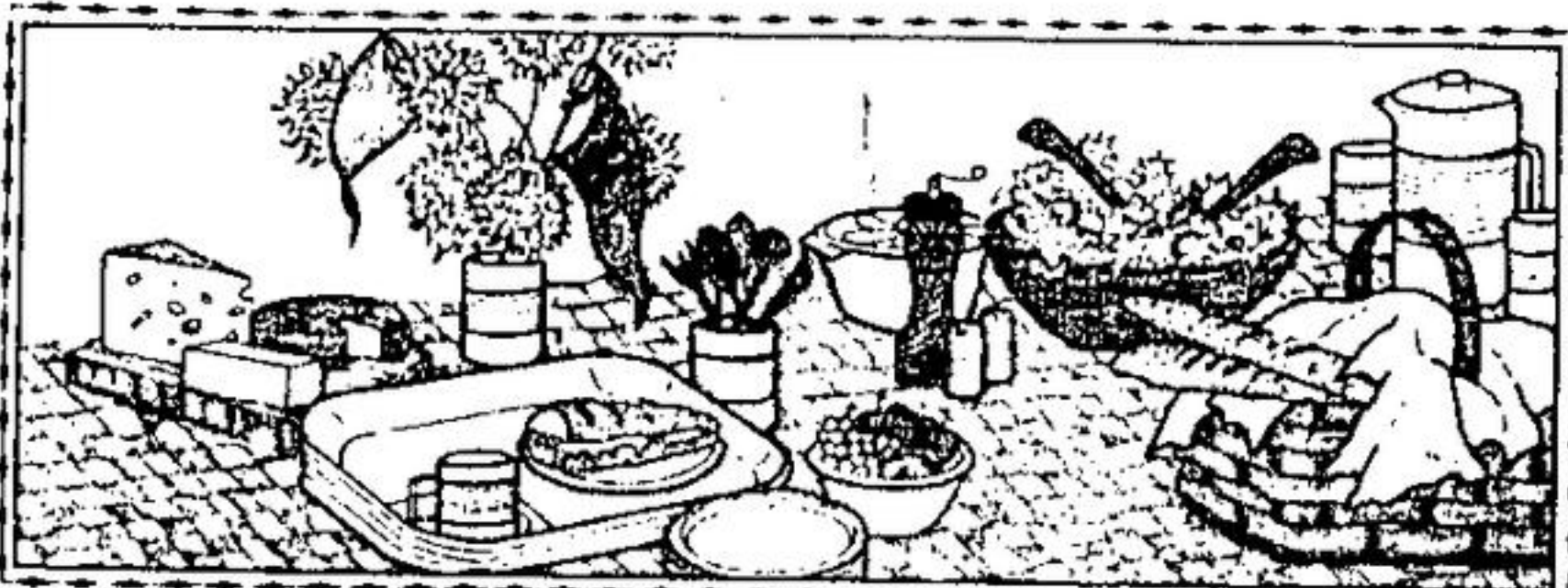
