

Cancer unit has annual meeting

Claudette Smith, Halton campaign chairwoman, was pleased to report a subtotal of \$40,041.29. The Terry Fox fund yielded \$39,632.77, thus giving Halton a total of \$79,714.06.

The combined campaign total for Halton Hills as of September 30 is \$100,669.15. This total shows that once again Halton Hills is a warm, giving, caring community. The Canadian Cancer Society thanks you, Halton Hills.
