Chrysler Raiders almost defeated in tough battle against Midland Athletics

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders increased their unbeaten string to six games by narrowly defeating the Midland Athletics 4-3 last Sunday in Midland.

In a hard-fought game with good goaltending by both teams the difference between the players seemed to be that Georgetown came up flat while Midland played good hockey all night. For that reason, the Georgetown win seems all the more impressive: to be able to play a poor game and stil come out on top the winner.

Raider coach Gerry Inglis said after the game that the

team was flat because they hadn't played in two weeks and the lapse had hurt the team. The last game the Raiders played was against Port Elgin in a 10-1 romp, so the players were not finely tuned for the game against an improved Midland team, he said.

"Midland didn't do anything fancy, but they were able to tie us up and shot the puck into our end and make us go after it. We started to get trapped with four guys forward and they had a number of three on one breaks," Inglis said. "Two of three goals were scored on us that way," he added,

Inglis was impressed by the goaltending of Midland's new goaltender, Randy Jackson who made some difficult saves during the game. According to the coach, Raider goalie Peter McDuffe played one of his best games of the season and was sharp on all but one of the shots on net be handled.

Coach Inglis said the Midland team has played two recent games against Orillia and Collingwood, both top teams in the Intermediate A league, and they just lost by a close margin - so the team cannot be taken lightly. In fact, the Raiders didn't score

the game winning goal until three minutes were left in the final period to give them the 4-3 victory.

The Midland team played the game with only two forward lines which was an effective tactic for them. Although Inglis said he thought Georgetown carried the game and controlled the play, the Midland strategy to pressure the Raiders by dumping the puck into their end tied up the Raider attack.



Chrysler Raider player changes in future required for a championship hockey team

Coach of the Raiders, Gerry Inglis, says after last Sunday's game at Midland that the team is still weak on defence - he admits that the defence will have to be strengthened. "Everybody keeps talking about the Hardy Cup for the Raiders, but we have to get out of Ontario first," Inglis says.

Ralder General Manager, Dave Kentner, says that the team will have to improve to meet the standards of Hardy

best lockey players on the Raider club. The OHA has outlined a system for each general manager to follow for the intermediate A league. The team is given 30 blank cards at the beginning of each hockey season. From the start of the season, 21 players from the previous team are automatically protected under OHA rules. By January 10, this is the last day a team can release a player from its roster. The player can still sign with another team the has five days to do so).

Also by January 10, each team in the league must name a maximum of 21 players or submit 21 blank cards. The Raiders will be submitting a list of players they will protect, but Kentner says, "instead of 2) players, we will name 19 and have two blanks to play later." February 10 is the last day to fill in the blank cards.

When asked what areas the club is trying to improve on, Kentner says, "this club has more firepower than any other club in the league. We have four solid lines; three exceptional lines. The only reason the fourth line isn't exceptional is becau e sometimes the players at rerratic in their play.

Keniner feels that the team needs to strengthen the left side of the team and the defence. "We also need to solidify our goaltending," Kentner says, but adds that solidifying the goaltending does not necessarily mean a change from the present situation.

One of the promising prospects that the Raiders hope to acquire is Mike

Marson from Scarborough, a former NHL left winger with the Washington Capitals. Marson was drafted 19th overall in the league when he broke into the pros in 1974. The 5'8" Marson is expected to attend the next Raider practice with his buddy, Rick Kessell, of the

Raiders. Marson was reported to have said he would attend last week's practice with the Raiders, but because Rick Kessell could not attend the practice, Marson did not attend either. Kentner has hopes that if Marson joins the team, Ron Twiss, premier left wing and defence player for the Raiders could go back to defence to strengthen any weaknesses there.

The Raiders' latest move to improve the team's defensive play has been in talking to former WHA goalie Wayne Wood. Wood was at the Raiders' practice last week. Kentner was contacted by Rick Curran of Bramada Sports Management in Toronto about Wood who last played hockey in the American Hockey League with Adirondack last season, a form club of the Detroit Red Wings.

Kentner says Wood has signed a two year contract with Detroit, but there is a stipulation in his contract that he only has to play for Adirondack or Detroit. Because both teams do not require his immediate services, Wood is free to play hockey with Georgetown but if he does not report to either team if they request him to, he "stands to lose a bundle of

money", Kentner says. Wood played in the WHA from 1974 to 1978 and managed a respeciable 3.89 average. He was drafted by the New York Hangers in the seventh round and was picked 83rd overall in the 1971 amateur draft.
