Raiders continue to dominate Intermediate A league standings

Georgetown's awesome offensive scoring power continues to shine as the Chrysler Raiders blasted the Orillia Terriers 12-1 in Intermediate A action last Saturday night.

For the Raiders, it was their second game of the weekend, but the team showed no signs of tiring during the game. Coach Inglis said that goalie Peter McDuffe played an

excellent game in the nets for the Raiders. He held the Orillia team scoreless until three minutes into the final period.

The Raiders dominated the scoring in the first period on goals by Steve Lyon, Ron Twiss and Dan Eastman. Coach Inglis mentioned that the lopsided score was not reflected in the play of Orillia, but the Raiders were able to utilize their body well in this

fast-paced game.

The game was characterized by few whistle stops. In the free-wheeling encounter, Georgetown only took three penalties, all in the second period. Al Woods, who played a strong game for the Raiders, opened the scoring in the second period after deking out an Orillia Terrier defenseman and goalie. Woods was impressive all night in the

corners, passing the puck out well for his teammates.



John Cook scored the next goal for the Raiders after

Georgetown continued to pepper the Orillia goaltender. Dan Eastman walked through the Orillia defence pairing and rifled a good wrist shot on Clyde Harris for the next goal by Georgetown to advance the lead to 6-0.

On the power play, defenseman Mike Keeler scored for the Raiders on a wrist shot that surprised the Orillia netminder. Bruce Ellison ended off the

scoring in the second period by tipping in a shot from the point by John Boyce.

In the third period, Ray Tonelli hustled for two goals and one assist to lead his team to four more goals.

Notes: Bruce Ellison had a strong game for the Raiders by scoring one goal and assisting on three others; winger Dan Eastman has 5 goals in the past two games; Ray Tonelli had two goals and two assists for the game.

Coach Gerry Inglis said after the game that the Raider defense was moving out of their own end much quicker than in previous games. However, he still says that he wants to head-man the puck quicker to trap their opponents' forwards. As far as the offense is concerned, Inglis says it is hard playing other teams when the Raiders are using four forward lines because, "the players just don't get a lot of ice time."

Joe Ens was switched from defense to right wing for the Orillia game, which is his normal position to play. Ens says he is more comfortable playing right wing but he says he'll play wherever the coach puts him, "as long as the team is winning," he says.

Gems play better hockey on road games: coach

The Junior B Gems are having trouble winning on home ice these days as their 7-2 loss to the Burlington Cougars makes it the third consecutive time Georgetown has lost at home.

Coach Tom Daley says he doesn't know what the problem is, but offered the suggestion that the team may relax a little more for road games and thus follow his instructions more carefully. In Barrie last Nov. 13 the Gems played a convincing brand of hockey to win

disciplined team," he said. "They skate a hundred miles a game." Daley added that Burlington outskated his team and Georgetown's defence was not consistent throughout the contest.

The lone goal by the Gems in the second period was scored by defenseman Mike James. The Gems' only goal of the shot by Curt Fitzsimmons on a power play.

Another shot from the right point resulted in the next goal for Burlington. Burlington ended off the scoring in the first period when a break-down in the Georgetown defence caused an uncovered Cougar forward to take a pass-out from behind goalie Mark Hulme and score unopposed.

Notes: Former Georgetown Gemini, Dave McGilloway, has started to play for the Acton Junior B Sabres and the Gems have a lawyer working for them to try and get McGilloway back to Georgetown. Gems' manager last year, Chris Milne, recruited McGilloway last season and Acton was compensated for the high-scoring forward with a \$300 cheque.

The Cougars scored again in the second period when a Burlington forward was able to sneak in behind the Georgetown defence to scoop a pass from the corner to make the score 4-0. After the game, coach Daley remarked that there was a definite breakdown between the defence and centreman on each of the goals that were passed out from behind the Gemini net.

When McGilloway moved to Newmarket of the Provincial Junior A Hockey League earlier this season, the Gems lost a valuable player to the team. But when McGilloway decided to quit Newmarket to play for Acton this year, he violated the terms of the agreement settled with Acton last season, according to the Gemini management. The Gems either want compensation for McGilloway or they would like to see him back in a Gemini uniform.

The Gems will be playing their annual Christmas benefit game on December 21 against Oakville.

Raiders trounce Athletics, avenge near loss week before

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders ended any speculation last Friday that Midland can play in the same rink with Georgetown in back to back games. Avenging a close 4-3 match, the Raiders pumped 53 shots on net against Midland to trounce their opponents 15-6.

The Raiders' win against last place Midland extends their winning streak to seven games with one game tied, in the past eight outings. Raider coach Gerry Inglis said there was a big difference between last week in Midland and this week. The previous two weeks of inactivity had hurt the team when they played in Midland, he said. However, Inglis noted that his team gave up three

goals on Friday night that shouldn't have been let in, because of the free-wheeling type of play. In the first period, the Raiders had some trouble with the puck in their own end by trying long clearing passes. Inglis said that when the team settled down in the second period and concentrated on short crisp passes, it paid off for the team.

Dan Eastman for the Raiders opened the scoring with a perfect set up from Al Woods in the corner. Eastman was open in the slot and made no mistake about his wrist shot to the goalie's stick side. Gary Ford tallied the second goal for Georgetown with a tip in shot from a pass by Colin Gordon. The sometimes sloppy passing of the Raiders out of their own end resulted in the first

Midland goal as Midland forward Bill Beauchamp stole a pass from centre and fired a slap shot that beat goalie Peter McDuffe.

With 4:41 remaining in the first period, Mike Keeler on defence scored with assists by Eastman and Gordon. Keeler, who was playing his first game for the Raiders this season, has only practiced twice with Georgetown. After the game, coach Inglis said he was very impressed with the play of Keeler. "He moved the puck very well during the game," Inglis said. Keeler was a starter for Georgetown last season, but he only joined the team two weeks ago. The period ended with the Raiders in front 6-3.

The Raiders took control of the game in the second period by outshooting their opponents 21-3. Bruce Ellison led the scoring barrage by netting the first two goals of the period. His first goal came on a pass in front of the net by Al Woods that he connected solidly with and his second came off a shot by Joe Ens at the blueline. Gary Ford and Gary McFadyen scored singles for the Raiders while Dan Eastman shot for two which gave him a hat trick for the night.

Ron Fogal fired a quick slap shot with only 27 seconds into the third period to make the score 13-4. However, the Raiders, now with a big lead, did nothing to match their poised play of the second

period. Goals in the last five minutes of play by Ron Twiss and Captain Juri Kudrasovs ended the scoring for the Raiders. Kudrasovs played a strong game by assisting on three goals.
