

Deli's her new career

Jeanette's Dutch Deli in Moore Park Plaza has only been open since the beginning of November, but Jeanette Millesse already has an established clientele.

"If someone asks me for an item I don't have, I'll try and get it for them," Mrs. Millesse said.

Jeanette and Leo Millesse are co-owners of the new delicatessen, which Jeanette runs. She is assisted by her "chief advisor," Mary Jepson, who has had ample delicatessen experience. Nita Millesse and Karen Suk work on a part-time basis at the deli. Since there is a fresh meat counter on the premises, Mrs. Millesse found it necessary to hire a butcher who, by coincidence, happens to be Dutch.

When the delicatessen in Moore Park Plaza was advertised for sale, Mrs. Millesse was encouraged by her husband to embark upon a new career and start a Dutch delicatessen.

MEET NEEDS
"I enjoy meeting people and I thought a Dutch delicatessen would meet the needs of the local people," she said. "Before this store opened, people would go to Acton and Brampton for Dutch items."

Undoubtedly, Mrs. Millesse's interest in Dutch cuisine stems from her Dutch background and her enjoyment of cooking.

At lunch time, she serves piping hot Dutch-style pea soup, which she makes daily, and sliced smoked meats on freshly-baked kaisers. Hot coffee is available throughout the day.

Although there's a vast array of Dutch foods ranging from chocolate animals and Dutch-style baked goods to chocolate letters, the store is not exclusively Dutch, since Canadian as well as Dutch-smoked meats and cheeses are regular items offered for sale.

"Unfortunately, many people are afraid to try Dutch-style meats," Mrs. Millesse said. "They are different than Canadian meats and quite often Dutch meats aren't as spicy."

"It's Dutch custom to put prices on everything," she said. "All of our Dutch items have the prices marked on them. There is nothing more embarrassing for a customer than to ask the price of an item and then not be able to afford it."

AFRAID TO TRY

The Dutch theme is clearly reflected in the decor of the deli. Mrs. Millesse has selected blue and white tile wall paper, blue and white gingham cafe curtains and posters from Holland to accent the mood.

A visit to Jeanette's Dutch Deli will be well worth while, especially during the upcoming season when we're all looking for little treats to serve our holiday guests.

Acton worker retires after fifty years

One of Halton Hills' best known town workmen has punched his time card for the last time after devoting more than 50 years to the community.

Although Sam Tennant's doctor won't let him return to finish his final week of work after he spent last week in a Guelph hospital, he won't retire officially until Friday.

Mr. Tennant joined the town of Acton works crew in February, 1934, according to town records. He also served 35 years with the town's volunteer firefighters until he retired in January.

Mr. Tennant moved to Acton from Stewarton in 1941 and has lived in his Wellington Street home with his wife and son since 1955.

There may have been some bad days mixed with the good ones over the years but basically he says he enjoyed the whole variety of jobs he did with the town.

When he first joined the Acton works crew there were only five men on it, he says. Those five did everything, water and sewers, town maintenance, snow plowing and sanding streets, parks, arena and cemetery maintenance and even dug graves by hand.

Mr. Tennant is proud of the record the crew established to always have streets cleaned out after a storm so that people could get cars out to go to work the next morning. Many's the night they worked 24 hours straight to accomplish it.

Amalgamation with Georgetown under regional government may have had its drawbacks but it isn't all bad, Mr. Tennant says.

Projects have been completed in Acton which would never have been done without amalgamation because Acton couldn't have afforded to do the jobs.

Probably one of his worst memories as a town workman resulted from an accident several years ago when a building collapsed at Cedarvale Park in Georgetown while he was inside it.

He was caught between a couple of studs and managed to wiggle his way free in spite of the water under the structure. Another worker was trapped and had to be dug out and taken to hospital with back injuries. Mr. Tennant was also taken to hospital but only examined and released, he says.

Retirement won't be the end of his working days, Mr. Tennant says. He'll find some odd jobs to do because he isn't the type to just sit around.

If nothing else he'll still be down at the Acton Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 197, putting around the lawns and flowers.

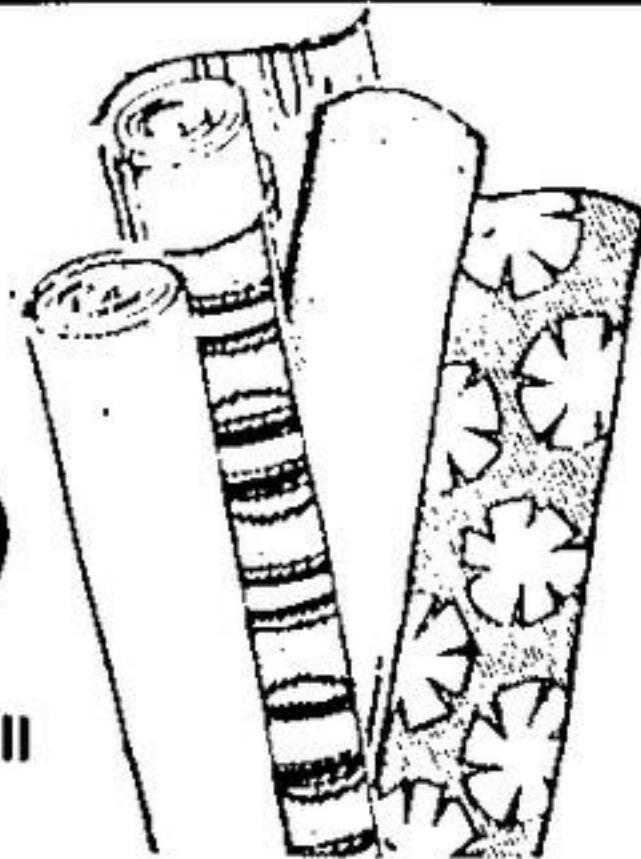
