Both the GDHS midget and junior boys basketball teams played several exhibition games in the last two weeks to start off their 1980-81 season.


Last Monday both teams hosted Acton for exhibition games. The teams lost both their games with the junior boys being defeated by a score of 53 to 45 and the midget team

WALLEYE NOW: That is if the ice is thick enough to hold you. The best time to go for Walleye is as soon as the 'hard water" season starts, when the fish are still shallow over rock, gravel or rock rubble, in 10 to 30 feet of water. If you ask me what type of tackle, I would recommend your smoothest running reel whether that was a spinning of baitcasting, as long as it runs smooth.

NEED PROPER EQUIPMENT

Select a rod of about three feet long, even if you have to cut down an old rod although you can buy rods of this type. The action must be stiff and the line should be about twelve pound test, use ice fishing mono if you wish. Get a supply of Swedish Pimple lures and add or "sweeten" the hook with a piece of fish flesh or the eye of a perch (if you can get it) but the absolute best lure as far as I am concerned is the Rapala

This lure travels in a circle when jigged up and down and once again you can sweeten the hook but make sure it is the belly hook. Possibly set a tip up line and jigg with the other, just so long as you are in attendance to both lines it is

The Walleye season is open all year on Georgian Bay and until March 31 inland from there where the best fishing is. Several other areas are also open across Ontario, so check your regulations for some of the best fishing you have ever had. Fish from one hour before sunrise to one hour (maybe two) after, and fish again about an hour before sunset to one or two hours after. Get your self warm the rest of the time or look for a place to fish trout as they are active during the mid-day of winter. MOOSE POLICY



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
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
