In their first game of the triple-header, midget boys lost a close game to Acton with a score of 45-44. The high scorers for this game were: Paul Watts with 12 points; Gary Hulbert with 11 pts.; Jeff Budweiser with nine pts.; Joe Clare with eight pts.; and Blake Harrison scored four points.

The second game of the night was the junior boys. Here the Redmen merely overpowered the Rebels to finally defeat them with a score of 72-41. High scorers for Georgetown were Jeff Smith with 16 points and John Scott with 14 points.

The strength of Acton's junior team is shown by the fact that they have already won two tournaments they have participated in.

Christmas books for outdoorsmen

The Ministry of Natural Resources is "very impressed" with the action of hunters during the 3 day Deer Hunt Nov. 3, 4, 5, 1980. Only two complaints of trespass among 890 hunters, and a total of 125 deer as the final count. Plenty of biological information was gathered as a result of the survey taken from successful hunters, and an early start will be made in getting a hunt for 1981.

The new Moose management policy will control wolves in specific areas, where they are "disproportionately" reducing moose populations. Quality of moose habitat will be maintained or enhanced. Hunters will be "encouraged" to enroll in a 20 hour moose hunter education certificate course. These and many other changes and programs will be put into effect as soon as possible.

BOOKS for Christmas: Oxbow Books in downtown Georgetown has a fine selection of books available and may order what is not on the shelf. One book almost any fisherman would enjoy is Bright Waters, Bright Fish by Roderick Haig-Brown. This has got to be one of the finest books to come along since his last one, and the author finished the final draft just before he died, two days in fact. One of Canada's best known and respected author-conservationists, Mr. Haig-Brown writes with a depth of feeling that we should all experience.

Buy it for someone or just for yourself. At \$19.95 it is well worth the price for a life long friend that a book should be. Other gifts that will bring a sparkle to the eye of the Man or Woman in your life or the one you fish with is the greatest innovation for the fisherman to come along in many years - the new Berkley Fishing Partner. This tackle box is hung on a belt around the waist or may be placed on the suspenders of the waders for the deep water fisherman.

The box provides a flip down work bench where you can lay your rod, and work without holding rod or box. I have been using an over-the-shoulder tackle box for the last 25 years and I never go stream or wader fishing without it. This one should prove even better and it is definitely on my list of gifts (if someone reads this). By Berkley about \$25, but I am not sure of this, it may be less, or more.

If you want to make sure he really is fishing, get him a camera. Creative Camera should be able to get you the new Minolta Weathermatic-A which is a waterproof camera in the 110 format. It has a built-in flash and is good underwater to 15 feet. Use it skiing or fishing, even swimming and get those shots that you always envied.

The Boat Show is set for Jan. 9 to 18, 1981 at Exhibition place, Toronto. Worth looking at for the boat buff and the fisherman who goes on the watery deep. From the Ministry of tourism or Ontario Travel comes a booklet indicating over 50 outfitters who offer ice fishing in Ontario. Call at no charge to (416) 965-4008. Go through the operator and tell her it is a COLLECT CALL.

Cooking For The Festive Season. I have decided to do a special column on this aspect of the season and will offer a few here. Watch for the special in the next weeks paper. CRANBERRIES add a colorful addition to almost all meals. They can be used for color or taste and go well with almost every kind of meat or side dish, so don't spare them in cooking or mixing. Why not broil a fillet (or several) of Walleye. Take the fillet and sprinkle paprika and salt and pepper after coating with butter.

Boil cranberries and dress the serving dish with berries for color and the tartness of the taste. For a roast of any wild game meat or even beef, make a gravy of WILD RICE. Crush the rice by using the coffee grinder and use the resultant flour for gravy; fine distinctive flavor.

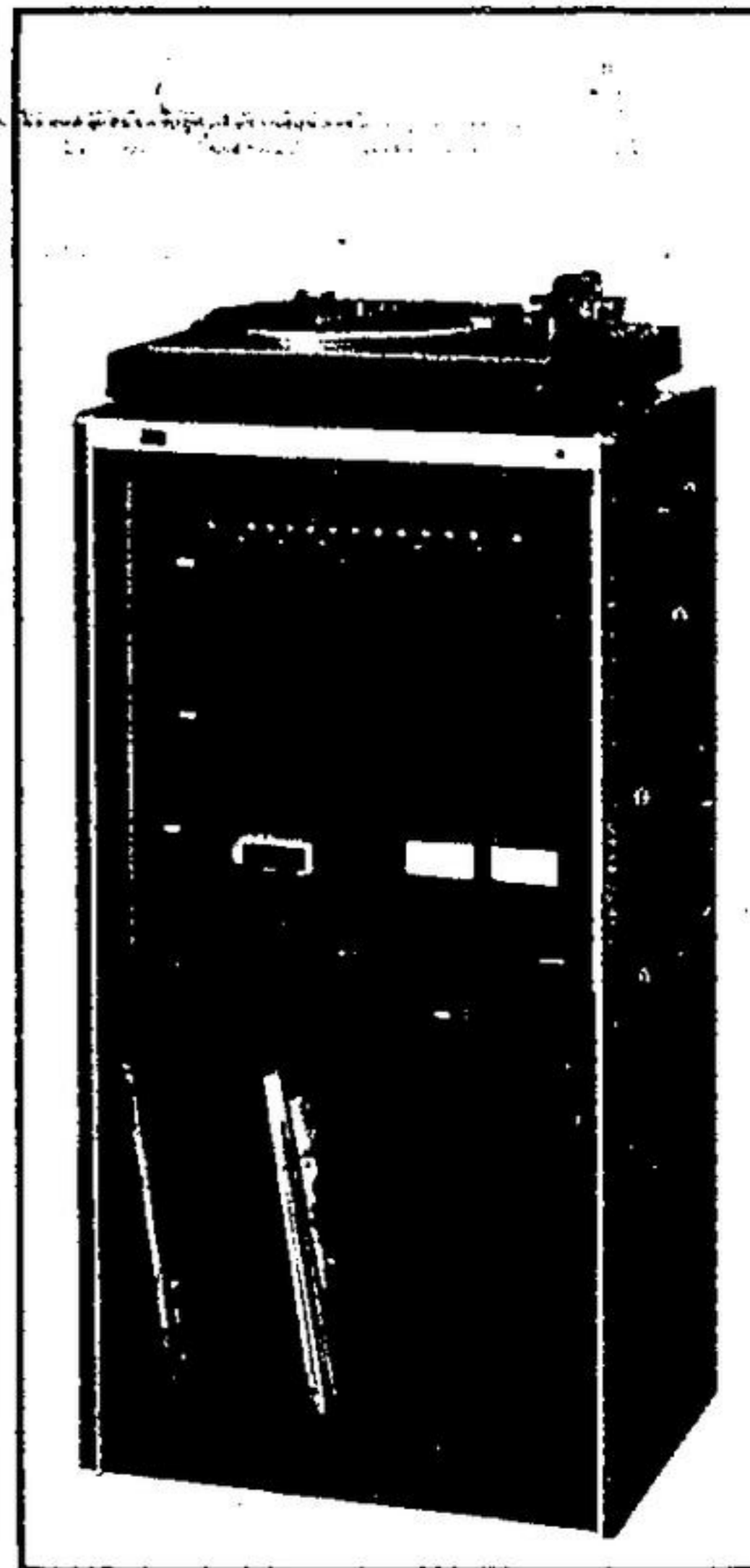
