

Same season for moose hunt

The Ministry of Natural Resources has announced the moose hunting seasons for 1981. These will be basically the same as 1980, with some changes in the number of hunters and dates. Special seasons for primitive weapons, bows and blackpowder guns, mean a lot these days and the best way to obtain this information is to contact the ministry as to reilerate here would be redundant.

Bill 59, an act to amend the Ontario Game and Fish Act, has received royal assent. Many changes in the use of wildlife resources are provided for in this bill. There is now more clear and precise control of hunters, trappers and other users of wildlife resources numbering three to four million persons.

It is stated that "It also resolves many concerns of naturalists, humane societies and animal welfare groups". A few of the changes are: separate classification for elk, additional controls for preservation of deer and moose, raising fines to \$5,000 from \$1,000 (one of the best) and provisions concerning the training of hunting dogs and field trails outside the regular seasons. Forewarned is forearmed; read and learn to avoid problems.

The conservation authorities provide plenty of good, sound family fun; Metro region, Albion Hills, Palgrave, Boyd, Claireville, Heart Lake, Greenwood all provide skiing. Cold Creek also provides skiing with the addition of a trap range open all weekend and rifle and archery ranges open on weekends. Closer to home perhaps is Mountsberg Wildlife Centre where things are really popping for the family. Dec. 18 (tomorrow) "Christmas and Nature" is a free program open from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. with sleigh rides, chestnuts roasting on an open fire, free hot apple cider, (honest) puppel show, and lots more ...

The winter program at Mountsberg will include picnicking and skating, tobogganing, hiking, cross country skiing and animal barn and wildlife walkway. South and west of Campbellville, call 878-4131 for details and directions. The Credit Valley Conservation Authority has a special winter program and 1 will have details here next


