Continued from page A5 Immediately prior to the scheduled opening of the new complex, and a special arts lottery in 1982. "We don't propose to start the lottery until then in order to avoid any conflict with Actario," Mrs. Day explained.

Arts Council member-groups which have begun actively considering their own fund-raising events include the University Women's Club, which is planning an Historical House Tour, and the Georgetown Choral Society which has established a special fund-raising committee. Georgetown Little Theatre, a founding member of the Arts Council, is conducting a separate campaign and has thus far raised \$23,000 towards its goal of \$30,000. "All in all, we are very pleased at the response and interest of our member-groups. We are therefore very hopeful that the different activities of the arts community in Halton Hills will have a large impact on the overall fund-raising drive," Mrs. Day said.

Georgetown Rotary Club - the third community organization to publicly pledge a five-figure fund-raising goal - is planning four major fund-raising activities in 1981. Rex Heslop, who is heading up the club's fund-raising efforts, says the first event in March will be a Las Vegas Night and will include two draws for trips to "southern destinations - courtesy of two tour companies." Later in the

year, the club plans to hold an Antique and Arts and Crafts Show and to donate its share of the proceeds from the Industry '81 show it will be co-sponsoring with Brampton Rotarians in May. The fourth event - details of which are still unavailable - will take place the week of the opening of the new complex and feature "big name performers".

In the meantime, the Rotary Club's \$30,000 pledge will be an asset from the proceeds from the Rotary-Annes Dance held at St. George's Anglican Church Hall two weeks ago. Time is running out to "Donate now...and save on your 1980 Income Tax". Remember: a donation made before January 1, 1981 qualifies as a charitable deduction for income tax purposes. All donors will be issued an official receipt prior to income tax filing. Don't delay; do it today!
