Glen water problems foil Koil appeal

The shortlived controversy which followed installation of a Glen Williams sewermain by Koil Construction Ltd. two years ago has prompted Halton regional council to award a similar contract to a competitor.

Koil, a Weston company, failed to have council reconsider a Dec. 11 decision last Wednesday awarding the Oakville project to Agnew-Baillie Contracting Ltd. of Burlington, which estimated the project's cost at \$2,000 more than did Koil.

Attesting to the satisfactory completion of its Glen Williams sewer project, which prompted a neighborhood outcry after Koil workers inadvertently loosened a gasoline serving a nearby house, Koil officials last week claimed that engineering consultants who examined applicants for the Oakville job did not supply council with enough information about their firm.

Koil's tender bid of \$694,868

was about \$200 more than the lowest bid, submitted by Cuce Construction Ltd. of Mississauga. Cuce's bid was rejected for insufficient information and Koil lawyer Roy Kiet urged council to "preserve the integrity of the tender system" by awarding the contract to

the lowest acceptable bidder. Halton Hills Coun. Russ Miller refused to support Koil's appeal, recalling that he received numerous citizens' complaints about the Glen project regarding the condition of the site after construction.

Masked gunmen haunt city

Burlington residents are being warned to take precautions against three masked gunmen who are believed responsible for a series of beatings and a shooting which occurred in

the Burlington-Dundas area last week.

A 43-year-old Burlington woman was beaten in the parking garage of her apartment building on Regency Court Dec. 14. The following Wednesday evening, a man shot and seriously wounded a 28-year-old Dundas woman after knocking her to the floor and robbing her in the basement garage of her apartment building.

Less than two hours later, the same group of men robbed and beat a Burlington man in

an underground garage on Lakeshore Road East. So far, the robbers have taken mainly credit cards and a small amount of cash.

Police believe the three men enjoy the violence that has been a part of each robbery and will probably strike again. Patrols have been beefed up near apartment buildings, and will continue until the men are caught.

In each incident, the men have worn stocking masks, blue jeans and winter coats. Two of the men have been

described as being about 5 feet, 6 inches tall and having a thin build, while the third is said to be 6 feet tall, with a medium build.

Police are warning apartment dwellers to take extra precautions when driving their cars into underground parking garages. They recommend drivers stay locked in their cars for a few minutes after entering the garage until they can make sure everything is alright. If there is anything the least bit suspicious, police recommend driving out again.
