

Fogal 'outstanding' in win

Raiders edge Terriers 5-4

The last time the Raiders played Orillia, they trounced their blue and white opponents 6-2. But last Friday night in an away game against the Terriers, it was a different story as the Raiders had to come from two ties late in the third period to win 5-4.

In a close fast-paced game, a much improved Terrier team skated well against the Raiders who were missing star forwards Ray Tonelli, Ron Twiss and Gary Ford. Rick Kessel, who has been sorely missed for the past two Collingwood games, is still on holidays.

In an exciting period, but a close one for the Raiders, the play was balanced between the two teams with a number of end to end rushes put forth by both teams. Orillia opened the scoring in the third period to close the margin, 3-2.

On the next goal, Orillia surprised Raider goalie Peter McDuffe with John Cook in the penalty box for hooking. During the penalty, Orillia controlled the puck well and pressured the Raider defenders which finally resulted in a goal that tied the game at 3-3.

It was at this point the Raiders had to settle down and show their coach they have a third period hustling team.

ORILLIA MOMENTUM

With Orillia starting to gain momentum from their tying goal, Joe Ens scored a goal for the Raiders with assists going to Al Woods and Gary McFadyen. The Raiders' hustle began to pay off.

However, seconds after Ens' goal, Orillia scored again on a deflection from a shot from the point to again tie the game, this time, 4-4.

With 1:04 remaining in the game, the Georgetown team had little precious time to waste in finding the game winning goal. One minute later, John Cook scored on a beautiful pass by Bruce Ellison. Cook, who played an outstanding game all night, walked in on the Orillia goalie and put on a terrific deke from close in to the left side to score. Newcomer Keir Todd also assisted on the goal when the going gets tough. Georgetown proved they were willing to get tough and come back to win the game.

Coach Gerry Inglis says the team was precisely short of left wingers so every man on the team was playing unfamiliar positions and being juggled around on the lines. Inglis admitted that Orillia played an effective game in keeping Georgetown hemmed in their own zone quite often. He complimented the Orillia goaltender for making some super saves.

FOGAL OUTSTANDING

Coach Inglis says that Ron Fogal played an outstanding game for the Raiders. "If Ron Fogal plays the way he did tonight in every game, he could be the most outstanding player in the league," Inglis says. "He played one hell of a hockey game, he got the puck and moved it out of our end well and gave some good stiff body checks."

Inglis says he was impressed with Steve Lynn, especially the way he was able to come back quickly after venturing deep into Orillia territory. Juri Kudrasovs says that the team didn't play as well as they could, but he says a number of factors such as having four players absent,

and playing away from home to a crowd of only 120 people at the most) made a difference. But Kudrasovs says the team showed good style in not giving up, but he admits the team should have won the game earlier in the game instead of waiting until the last three minutes.

In the opening period, the Raiders came out playing Orillia as if they had forgotten their loss to Collingwood the previous weekend.

However, due to some terrific goaltending, the Raiders were not able to run up a big score on Orillia. Peter McDuffe was also hot in the nets to make some key saves in the period to keep Georgetown in the game.

ORILLIA SKATING

Orillia came out skating well and were able to score first on a screenslap shot from the left face-off circle. Georgetown had been hemmed in on that particular play and when they failed to clear the puck out, Orillia took control and scored.

Although Orillia was goal hungry, Georgetown soon came back to tie the score 1-1 on a goal by Joe Ens at 5:52 into the period. Al Woods and Ron Fogal assisted on the goal.

The two opposing goaltenders did not have many shots to stop in the period (Georgetown 10, Orillia 12), but all of the shots were potential goals.

McDuffe was hot in net for the Raiders. The line of Eastman, Kudrasovs and Gordon were particularly effective with their hustle. If shots on goal are any indication of a game, the score should have remained tied as each team had nine shots on net in the second period. However, the red and white

were able to find the net twice in the period to end it 3-1. The depth and overall better skills of the Raiders began to show against the Terriers, although Orillia continued to skate well.

ELLISON SCORES

Leading off the scoring for the Raiders in the second period was Bruce Ellison, assisted by John Cook and Ron Fogal. The line of Keir Todd, Cook and Ellison showed a lot of hustle during the period.

The Kudrasovs, Eastman, Gordon line continued to play well with Eastman getting a few "sure-goal" chances with the others on the line showing lots of hustle.

Notes: Orillia outshot the Raiders, 32-30 in the game. In the last period, Orillia had 13 shots on net while Georgetown had 9.

After last Saturday's game against Barrie, the Raiders will be away until February on a honeymoon with his new bride. Eastman will be sorely missed by the Raiders as he has been a consistent scoring threat on the team. He has not played a bad game since he started with the Raiders 10 games ago.

The senior boys team of Rick Eastwood, Gary Gillespie, Craig Carlisle and Glenn Gibbs also placed second in the 200 m medley relay.

Another second place relay award went to the junior boys team of James Bydevaate, Don Elson, Peter Morris, and

Marc Bourassa in the 200 metre medley.

FIRST PLACE

The only first place in the 200 m medlies was achieved by the junior girls team of Heather Mickey, Cheryl Thompson, Debbie Newman and Erin MacIntyre.

There were also many good swims by Rebel swimmers. Among these were Karen Coleman, first, in the 100 m breast stroke, and also a second in the senior girls 200 m free style.

Chiropractor part of Raider organization

Not every hockey team has one - but the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders have one, so do the Toronto Maple Leafs, the Chicago Black Hawks and the New York Rangers...What these four clubs all have in common is a team chiropractor.

The Raiders have a chiropractor at their disposal on a 24-hour "on call" basis for the players. He is a man who is no stranger to the game of hockey. Dr. Edward Schroeder, 37, a resident of Terra Cotta who practices his profession in Brampton, has been a part of the Raiders organization for four years.

Born and raised in St. Catharines, Dr. Schroeder played Junior B hockey in that town before deciding to chase between hockey and school. He entered Brock University and after a year he transferred to Canada's only chiropractic college, located in Toronto.

He decided that although he could not embark on a pro hockey career himself, he would be able to treat professional athletes. Dr. Schroeder says that hockey is one of his major interests. He plays the game in Georgetown's Industrial League and other teams so that he is active playing hockey 12 months of the year.

TREATED BY CHIROPRACTOR

Schroeder says he first became interested in chiropractic when he was playing hockey for Brock University. He re-aggravated his back after playing a hockey game and he says he was almost paralyzed on the ice. The chiropractor who treated him was able to give him relief with some adjustments to his spinal system.

Schroeder notes that he was not treated with any type of drug when he was having his back problems. The reluctance to use drugs is one of the main differences between doctors and chiropractors in their training, he says, because, "in chiropractic college, we learned everything that a medical doctor has to know except for the use of drugs and surgery."

Currie with Raiders?
