About the Hills Ex-mayor's daughter killed

The 20-year old daughter of former Burlington mayor Mary Munro was killed in a Milton car crash New Year's Day. Sarah Munro, a third-year commerce student, died in a Hamilton hospital following the accident on Highway 25 near Henderson Road. Police say the car she was driving went out of control and fishtailed into an oncoming pick-up truck. Driver of the truck was uninjured.

Local dumps no danger

Former landfill sites in Halton Hills are not producing an appreciable amount of methane gas, a provincial study has found. But the ministry of environment has advised Oakville and Burlington to continue monitoring gas levels at dumps in their area. Produced by decaying garbage, explosive methane can remain trapped in pockets below the surface of a landfill site for decades before rising to the ground and dangerously dispersing.

Fire confined to bedroom

A fire in a house on River Drive caused \$7,000 damage before burning itself out Sunday night.

Deputy Fire Chief Bob Hyde said the family, whose name was withheld by his department, is most fortunate because damage was confined for the most part to one bedroom, although the entire house suffered smoke damage.

The family left their 84 River Drive house early in the morning, but their four-year-old daughter accidentally left an activated electric toy on her bed. The toy is believed to have caused the fire.

The deputy chief said that because the bedroom door was almost completely shut, and because of the modern construction of the house, the damage was a lot lighter than what it could have been. The family had just moved in Jan.

At almost the same time as the fire on River Drive, firefighters were called to a chimney fire at 15 Wilson Court. There was no damage. About 40 minutes later, there was a car fire at the Halton Hills Plaza. Damage in the fire was estimated at \$100.

Name chosen for special bus

A name has been chosen for the town's new bus service for the disabled, being organized by a volunteer committee headed by Coun. Marilyn Ser-

Coun. Serjeantson said Monday the winning name has been selected from the entries received, but the announcement won't be made for another week or more.

The committee hopes to tie up a number of loose ends at its meeting next week. There has been no final decision made as to whether the service will be contracted out, or whether the committee will have to administer the service itself, Coun. Serjeantson said.

"We've advertised to hear from people who would be interested in running the service, but we haven't got a lot of response," she said. "It's not really too practical for the committee to run it, because we're volunteers, and it's like

The proposed budget for the service is \$40,000, of which half must be raised by the public. The other half will be provided

by the province. There was a suggestion that the service would be receiving a grant, but this may not be the case because there are stringent requirements attached to the grant which the service might not be able to meet, Coun, Serjeantson sald.

Letters have been sent out to the community, requesting public financial support for the program, she said.

The budget for the program includes the cost of owning or renting a van, the gasoline, insurance and the cost of a driver. Arrangements would also have to be made, if the town ran the service Itself, to hook into an existing dispatch

Mr. Snow made the denial Monday evening during a question and answer session at the Acton Progressive Conservative Association annual meeting at which he was the guest speaker.

- In response to a question from the floor about the possibility of doubling up the present hydro transmission through the municipality Mr. Snow said it wouldn't happen in three years time. "I can't say it won't ever happen," he said, "but it won't happen by

Mr. Snow said everyone knows there is a need for a second fine out of the Bruce plant, but it is "not for this

Mr. Snow said the original plan calling for four transmission fines along the Halton Hills corridor has been "totally done away with" as far as he knows. At the same time, he can't say the present line will never by twinned.

"The second line from the Bruce is to south western Ontario, to feed the Kitchener-London area," he said, "It's not for this area. "They're looking at the different options now and the Environmental Assessment Board hearings will have to be held after that. The doubling of the Milton to Bradley line is not being considered at this time."

Liberal energy critic Julian Reed (Halton-Burlington) has warned residents to expect a twinning of the newly completed Bruce to Milton line in the near future as time constraints force hydro to abandon other potential routes where resident opposition and environmental hearings could slow down construction of a new corridor. When time becomes critical, bydro will just use the expedient route and double the line they already have, he says.

The corridor was the source of a seven-year battle between Ontario Hydro and the Interested Citizens Group before it was finally completed in July,
