## The little book that grew

After a five year effort to consolidate all aspects of minor hockey into one comprehensive book, the Georgetown District Minor Hockey Association finally have a manual that might well be the best one available for young hockey players today.

The manual has made such a good impression that the OHA is interested in perhaps using the manual in some form to distribute to all minor hockey centres. Both the Orangeville and Bolton minor hockey associations have requested copies of the Georgetown manual for their own scrutiny.

OHA INTERESTED

Tom Davidson, who recently spearheaded the manual's introduction into the Georgetown minor hockey program was in Toronto last October and presented a brief to the Ontario Hockey Association (OHA) about the manual. The OHA now have in their possession two of Georgetown's manuals and have a committee working on reviewing its possible use for minor hockey in the province.

What has impressed coaches, instructors and hockey executives about the 100 page manual is that it has such an abundance of resource material on hockey development and training, in addition to a rules and constitution section plus useful information such as first aid instructions and emergency phone numbers.

MANUAL EVOLVED The development of a minor hockey manual first started with the efforts of Bob Webster and Steve Curtis, Webster and Curtis were instrumental in the "centreboard" innovation whereby four tyke or novice house league teams can play games on half the ice surface for better ice

Over the course of three years, a Georgetown minor hockey manual was started that was modelled closely to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association (CAHA) manual. but there was no section on development or training to assist the coaches with their players.

The initiation of a comprehensive manual began last year when Tom Davidson suggested to the hockey executive

of the GDMHA that something be done to improve the development section of the manual. The next step followed logically enough: the executive appointed Davidson in charge of improving the manual.

Then Davidson, along with a committee, consisting of Gord Stewart, Paul Coulson, Gary Knight, John and Craig Netten (called the 'development committee') spent last summer working on a new manual.

**OPTIMIST SUPPORT** 

With the generous support of the Optimist Club of Georgetown, 100 copies were printed for about a one third reduction of the actual cost (\$15.00) by donating their labor and printing facilities free of charge. Every coach in the GDMIIA was given a copy along with hockey executive and five members of the Tri-County league.

What makes the present manual so unique is its extra sections on warm-up exercises, extra 'in-depth' hockey background for coaches on fundamentals and goaltending tips. In addition, the manual includes the innovative "point system" recently introduced to Bantams and teams above Bantams, and a constitution that all coaches must read thoroughly to define the rules by which the GDMHA is enverned

Tom Davidson, who completed much of the work in the development section of the manual, says the development committee included John and Craig Netten, because they felt more stress had to be placed on the training of goaltenders. The Netten father and son team went to work and volunteered their time to write a section in the manual for goaltenders as well as holding once a week goalie clinics for 12 weeks over the winter.

GOALLE CLINIC

"Most communities would give their eye teeth to have a gualie clinic like the one we have." Davidson says, "Milton wanted to participate in our goalie program," Davidson is particularly happy with the Atom program which stresses a six week development practice session for the boys which he hopes will leach all the basics and fundamentals of the game before the players participate in actual games.

Bracken's 10-3. Fendley says his BP team will be tough in the playoffs and the Norval team will have to watch out, "because we're on the move.

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
