Obituary

Tees was popular minister

Minister of St. George's Anglican Church for the past 21 months, Rev. Roswell Tees died Monday. He was 62. Born in Ottawa Sept. 15, 1918, Roswell (Ros) Frank Tees attended schools in St. Catharines and later enrolled at Queen's University in Kingston. While in his second year

at Queen's - in June, 1940 - he entered the Royal Canadian Air Force, undergoing flight training in Prince Edward Island before being shipped overseas.

After a forced landing in the Republic of Ireland, Mr. Tees was interned at the Curragh, County Kildare. During that time, he met Eileen Lewis, whom he subsequently married Sept. 14, 1943. He escaped internment later that same year and spent the remainder of the war in England training glider pilots for the D-Day landing as well as communicators for bomber command.

In September, 1944, the Tees' first daughter, Joyce, was born in Dublin. Shortly after the war, Eileen and Joyce emigrated to Canada to join Mr. Tees, who had returned in October, 1944.

A variety of occupations, including the insurance business and a stint at a Thorold paper mill, kept Mr. Tees occupied until 1963, when his two-year old part-time studies for the ministry became full-

time. He attended Diocesan Training School in Toronto and was ordained a deacon in May, 1964.

Rev. Tees served as assistant at St. James the Apostle in Hamilton for nine months before being ordained a priest on St. Nicholas Day (Dec. 6), 1964. He then moved to St. Paul's parish in Mount Forest, where he served another two and a half years. From 1970 to 1979, Rev. Tees was minister of St. Martin's parish in Niagara Falls.

He moved to St. George's in Georgetown April 1, 1979.

Rev. Tees died Monday at the McMaster University Medical Centre in Hamilton.

He is survived by wife Eileen, daughters Joyce (Mrs. D. Newman of Hamilton), Maureen (Mrs. D. Davison, also of Hamilton), Kathryn (of Zeballos, B.C.), Margaret (Mrs. R. Grasso of Albert Beyeroff, Alberta) and sons Donald of Kitchener and David of London. He is also survived by Marion (Mrs. C. Laird of Fort McMurray, Alberta).

by eight grandchildren, and sisters Ruth (Mrs. H. Sexton of Scarborough) and Marion (Mrs. C. Laird of Fort McMurray, Alberta).

A private family funeral service was held yesterday (Tuesday). A Requiem Eucharist will be held Saturday at 11 a.m. at St. George's on Guelph Street.

The family asks that, in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the St. George's Memorial Fund, the Primates World Relief and Development Fund or the Canadian Cancer Society.

The Canadian External Affairs ministry has received a mysterious letter which appears to shed some light on the disappearance of a 14-year-old Milton girl in Mexico almost a year ago. Catherine Sweet disappeared last February from a campground outside a tourist town in Mexico where she was vacationing with her family. Her family fears she has been abducted into white slavery. The contents of the letter aren't being revealed, to protect the investigation, but the girl's mother says it has given them more cause to fear for their daughter's safety.

Acton chamber seeks Bennett

The Acton Chamber of Commerce is still hunting for a guest speaker for its annual meeting after provincial housing minister Claude Bennett cancelled his scheduled appearance.

Coun. Dave Whiting, who is organizing the annual meeting, said the Acton BIA has wanted for some time to have Mr. Bennett as a speaker, and arrangements had been made to have him address the chamber's annual meeting.

"His office had confirmed that he would be there, and then he cancelled because he had other meetings which took priority," Mr. Whiting said. "I called his office and they said his appearance had never been confirmed in the first place."

The chamber hasn't given up entirely on having Mr. Bennett attend the meeting, but is looking for another speaker. In the meantime, no firm date for the meeting has been set.

Acton couple fears dog-napper

The Acton owners of a champion Great Dane which vanished from their front yard New Year's Day fear the animal may be one of several area dogs stolen by persons unknown.

A number of Acton area purebred dogs have mysteriously vanished recently, according to Jim and Sandy Miller of Sideroad 25, holders of a kennel licence, whose prize Great Dane similarly disappeared without explanation Thursday night about 8 p.m.

A thorough search of the surrounding area and checks with local pounds failed to turn up any sign of the dog, which was wearing a small, green nylon collar. The dog was confined inside a yard with two other dogs surrounded by a six-foot chainlink fence.

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New employment protection for domestic employees.

Effective January 1, 1981.

A new regulation has been issued expanding employment protection for domestic employees (cooks, housekeepers, nannies), who work more than 24 hours a week. It does not apply to baby sitters or companions.

- Wages**
 Domestic employees are entitled to \$24 per day, \$132 per week, \$568 per month or \$3 per hour.
- Room and Board**
 Householders may deduct up to \$50 per week from a domestic employee's wages for room and board.
- Time Off**
 Domestic employees are entitled to at least 36 consecutive hours of free time per week without deduction from wages. If work is performed during this free time, the equivalent amount of time off or payment at not less than \$3 an hour must be given.
- Annual Vacations**
 Domestic employees are entitled to at least 2 weeks of vacation per year and to at least 4 per cent of annual wages as vacation pay.
- Public Holidays**
 Domestic employees are entitled to seven paid statutory holidays per year. If work is performed on the holiday, another day off with regular pay must be given before the next annual vacation.

All domestic employees, including those working less than 24 hours a week and baby sitters and companions continue to be covered by standards for termination of employment, pregnancy leave, equal pay for equal work and collection of wages.
