# Lindsay takes midget tourney



Two top local runners outclassed their American opponents in placing first and third in the mile event at the annual Eastman Invitation Track and Field meet held over the week-

The runners, Doug Smith and John Warnock, were invited to East Tennessee State University in Johnson City and competed against some of the best university milers in the

United States. Smith won the mile event with the time of 4:15.4 (eighttenths of a second behind former teammate Ian Clark's record which he set two years ago). Warnock settled for a strong third position with a time of 4:18. He was edged out by a native Tennessee runner.

LEAD CHANGED The first lap of the race was fast to establish positions on the track. Everyone then tried to settle into a culck pace. The event was tactical, however. as the pace varied throughout the race, and the lead was exchanged some four times. The top three runners of the race broke away from the rest of the field after about half a mile. It then came down to a finishing kick between the two Canadians and the Tennessee

With about 200 yards to go. Smith took the lead and maintained it to the wire. After the race, the Georgetown pair admitted being offered several American scholarships including such prestigious Universities as Georgia Tech, West Virginia and South Carolina.
