### Ice fishing hot stuff!

Severely cold weather has advanced the ice fishing season this year, and plenty of folks are taking advantage of it. A few walleye were taken from Lake Scugog over the New Year's weekend, where 14 inches of ice made for safe travel.

Lake Simcoe has 15-20 inches of ice and a wide variety of fish to try for. Every day sees more huts on the ice and last week was a hive of activity with huts moving into place all over the ice. For those who do not have their own hut or want to try ice fishing before building their own, try an outfitter that provides hut and supplies tackle and bait. One such is Lefroy General Store, just east of the store and ask for Ira, he has a good knowledge of the Lake and huts out now.

Crittenden Brothers at Jackson's Point have 14 huts and can accommodate 60 anglers out of Jackson's Point (416) 722-5172 or 722-5509. Floyd Hales, of course, is well known on the lake and runs 23 huts for 30-odd anglers. Call Floyd at (705) 426-7415 at Beaverton. Always call ahead to the bigger outfits and if they are full they may recommend another outfit if you do not know of one. As always ask what services they provide and what you have to bring yourself.

I often take time to walk outside the area of the huts and cut my own hole and try a jig for Lake Trout. Because of the wide ranging aspect of these jigs they can't be operated in a hut with other lines in use.

I have been having extremely good fishing with the Rapala jig and found it takes a lot of trout for me. When fishing the smaller models on bottom, they are excellent for whitefish and even walleye.

Always fill in or otherwise mark your fishing hole when on the ice, you wouldn't want someone to fall through. Owen Sound: the fishing here is also well under way, and some ice huts can be seen on the ice. However there is still some open water in the area of the river. Here is where the rainbow trout are taken along with splake and some whitefish.

A few perch are also caught but the main target is the rainbow and splake. Here is where the Sassy Shad fitting on a jig hook and worked slowly just off bottom is hitting the trout in good numbers. The Sassy Shad is made by Mister Twister and I use them for almost all game fishing situations depending on how they are rigged. Live minnows are used a lot here as well and Fred's Live Bait in Norval will provide these as they are not always available in Rainbow country.

**PROBLEMS WITH FISHING REGULATIONS**  
Take note that there are already problems showing up in the new fishing regulations. The same thing happened last year so I guess the proof readers don't know what they are doing. Division 27 Lake Nipissing pike should be May 20-Mar 15, walleye and sauger May 20-Mar 15, sturgeon July 1-May 31. A fish sanctuary should be listed at mouth of Sturgeon river Apr. 1-May 31 on map 3 page 31.

Two hundred thousand newly hatched brown trout had to be destroyed at Cordington Fish Hatchery near Brighton. According to Minister of Natural Resources James Auld, there was a "danger they would introduce a new fish disease to Ontario". Most of the trout were to be planted as yearlings in the spring of 1983 to create a brown trout fishery in western Lake Ontario. Others may have been stocked in Owen Sound area of Georgian Bay and the rest for a brood stock for the future.

There is no chance of replacing the fish for 1983. The ministry is now going to pacify us with rainbow, lakeers and that cursed splake again. They claim they will carry on an extensive search for brown trout from "Ontario", although where they will get them is beyond me. They got the others from Spring Creek Trout Hatchery in Montana where the eggs were actually "certified". Well there goes our brown trout fishery. Don't forget to watch the new T.V. show on Monday nights, Channel 19 at 8 p.m. put on by the Education Authority and the Ministry of Natural Resources.
