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Await trapping study

Art Hawes of Limehouse is one of many area trappers awaiting the results of an eight-year study by conservation officials into alternative methods to the controversial leghold trap. "Vd be interested in (learning about) anything that's more humane," Mr. Hawes commented last week, at the same time pointing out the need for an animal-attracting lure. Mr. Hawes is one of 450 trappers who work in the area supervised by the ministry of natural resources' Cambridge office and are looking forward to the ministry's study results this June as well as the marketing next year of a new kind of legspare trap. Much of the controversy surrounding the use of leghold traps stems from madequate line checks by amateur trappers, a practice which eventually forces the trapped animal to try and gnaw its way loose or otherwise injure itself.
