

# GDHS team places second, Kennedy Clipper swim meet

The GDHS swim team competed in two tournaments last week, including the Kennedy Clipper Classic Invitational Swim Meet in Windsor, where they placed a strong second. Georgetown placed first in a dual meet they hosted last Tuesday.

At Windsor on Saturday, the girls' team placed second overall, behind Kennedy C.I. of Windsor. The boys' side also placed second, as Oakwood C.I. from Toronto took first.

There were many notable performances at this meet, which included the junior girls freestyle relay. The team of Sheila MacDonald, Erin McIntyre, Debbie Newan and Cheryl Thompson took a first, and established a new meet record for the event. Another first was also taken by the team of Karen Colemann, Mary-Lynn Morrow, Allison MacDonald and Kim McLeod in the senior girls 200 m freestyle relay.

The junior and senior girls in the medley relay placed second and third, respectively. The combined junior and senior girls relay saw the Rebs place second.

Notable individual performances were by Allison MacDonald and Sheila MacDonald when they placed second and third in the 200 m freestyle and the first place finish of Cheryl Thompson in the girls 100 m individual medley, followed by Beth Stewart in the same race.

**McLEOD SECOND**

In the 50 m freestyle, Kim McLeod placed second and Heather Michie and Erin McIntyre placed second and third, respectively in the girls 50 m fly. Cheryl Thompson placed third, followed by Allison MacDonald in fifth place in the girls 100 m freestyle.

A first place for Heather Michie and a sixth for Heather Gibbs were obtained in the girls 100 m backstroke. In the girls 100 m breaststroke Beth Stewart took a first place finish with Karen Colemann in third place followed by Liz Ramsay in fourth place.

**SENIOR BOYS**

For the boys' side of the team the senior boys medley relay team placed third with the juniors taking a fourth in the junior medley race. The Rebs also placed fifth in the combined junior and senior boys relay.

The juniors also took a fourth in the junior boys 200 m freestyle relay and the seniors placed fifth in the senior boys 400 m freestyle relay.

**ELSON'S RECORD**

Individual performances were accentuated by Eric Elson's meet record in the boys 200 m individual medley. In the boys 200 m freestyle Malcolm McLeod placed third with Don Elson placing sixth.

Eric Elson also placed third in the boys 100 m freestyle. A third was obtained by Kevin Thompson in the 100 m fly. Kevin placed another third in the 100 m backstroke.

In the mixed junior, senior freestyle relay the Rebels placed fifth.

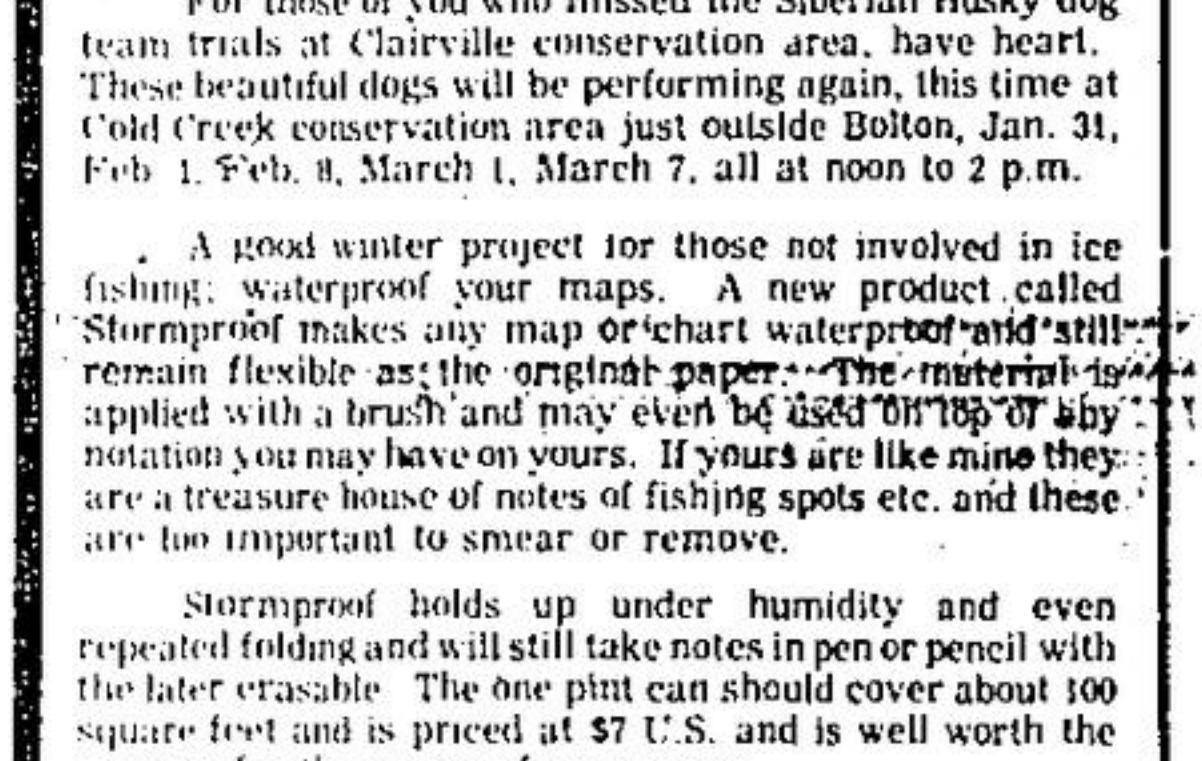
A good winter project for those not involved in ice fishing, waterproof your maps. A new product called Stormproof makes any map or chart waterproof and still remain flexible as the original paper. The material is applied with a brush and may even be used on top of any notation you may have on yours. If yours are like mine they are a treasure house of notes of fishing spots etc. and these are too important to smear or remove.

Stormproof holds up under humidity and even repeated folding and will still take notes in pen or pencil with the later erasable. The one pint can should cover about 100 square feet and is priced at \$7 U.S. and is well worth the expense for the saving of your maps.

Drop to bottom, raise slowly till the hook is just off bottom and jig slowly. This system has taken hundreds of herring and even a few other kinds of fish for Brian Donnelly of Bramalea. Brian runs the Cantire 1, a salmon charter boat on Lake Ontario, and this boat will now be run on Lake Simcoe in the summer after a full spring season in the Owen Sound area. The Cantire 1 will be back to Lake Ontario for the Great Salmon Hunt in the fall.

Other phone calls were for the location of spots in Owen Sound and these are listed here for your convenience; Colpoys creek, Owendon creek (Colpoys bay) Indian creek, Owen Sound harbor by Granaries, Squaw Point, Lleth (Bothwells creek) and Keefers creek. All these locations are in Bay waters only and are excellent trout and Splake fishing hot spots.
