Region hung-up on phone delays

Halton region's telephone switchboard system has come under attack from the region's health and social services committee.

Concerned that delays within the system could pose a serious problem for health department staff calling into regional headquarters during emergencies, committee chairman Carol Gooding last Wednesday asked council "to take the necessary steps to correct the problem".

"There is a certain amount of frustration," Coun. Gooding said, "that is continually experienced by members of council and members of staff out in the field who can't phone in and get direction (from the department)."

Money for the phone system is in the 1981 budget, Coun. Gooding noted. "Let's get on with it and spend the money." Questioned by Oakville

Mayor Harry Barrett, acting chief administrative officer Dennis Perlin told council that the region has a ten-year lease with Bell Canada to use their system, and that "staff are not looking at other switchboards simply because of the costs involved". The present system is only three years old, Mr. Perlin added.

The region's phone problems affect people calling into the building, he said, but has not affected communications between offices. Bell is currently conducting a survey of the switchboard ills and Mr. Perlin said a report from the company should be ready for the administration and finance committee by Feb. 11.

Meanwhile, Oakville Coun. Fred Oliver, said an extra phone should be immediately hooked up in the health department to ensure that one line is free in case of emergencies.

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
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
