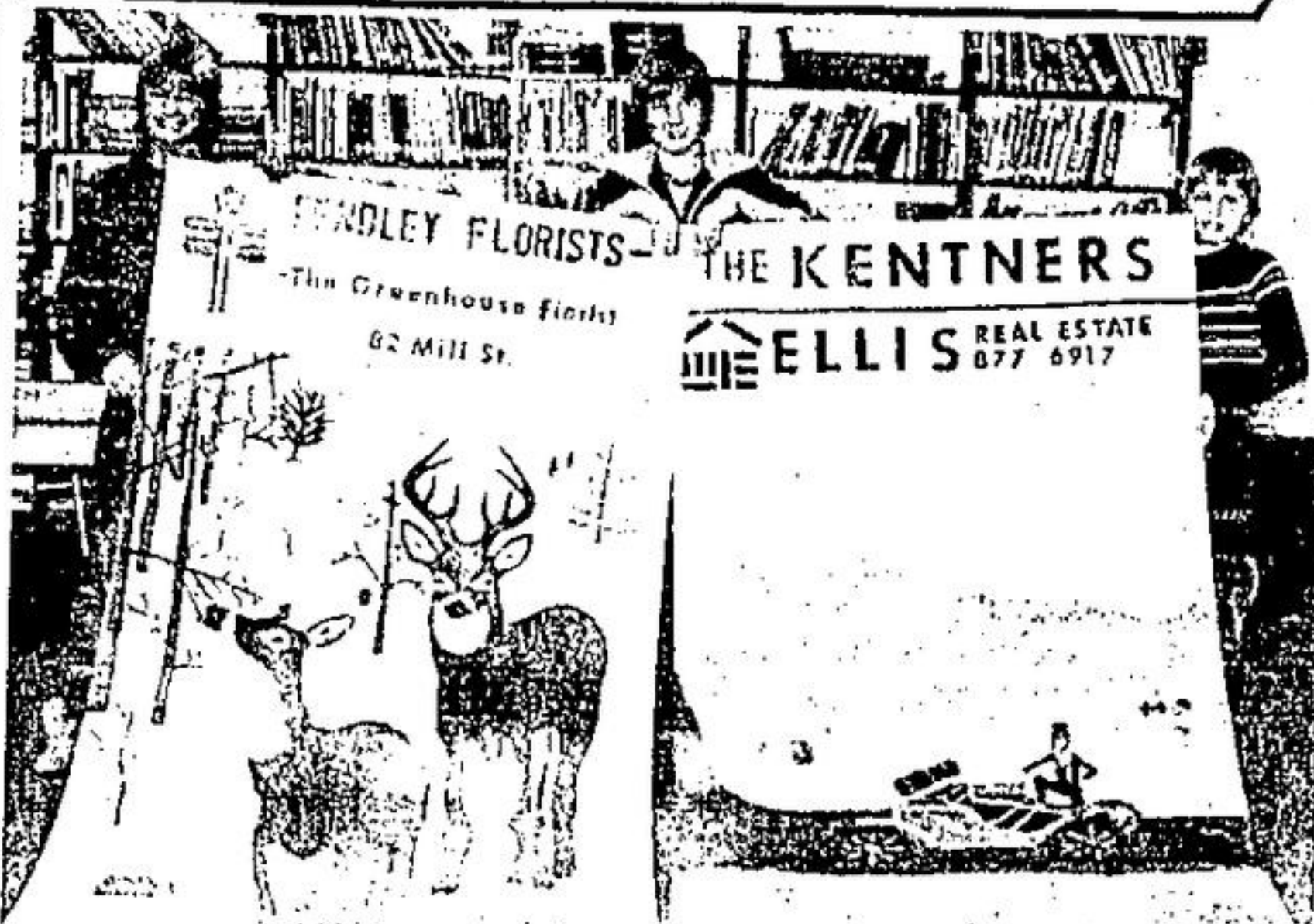

wagon" after all. Murt Allison Equipment Ltd. of RR1 Georgetown has responded to the request for a haywagon which will be used as travelling "community awareness display" about the new Halton Hills Library-Theatre Arts Centre.

A delighted Edith Hillman, the bandwagon organizer, said the donation of the eight-foot by 16-foot wagon "for as long as we need it" means that her planning committee can now get down to serious thinking about its design and operation.

Mr. Allison said that he was only too happy to support the project.

"I was one of those who was

strongly opposed to putting it (the Library) in Cedarvale Park," he said. "But fund-raisers can count on my support for its location downtown."

With less than a quarter of its commemorative seal-plaques remaining for sale, Georgetown Little Theatre this week urged all those planning to buy one not to delay any longer.

GLT fund-raisers explained that whereas several people and groups have indicated their intention to purchase plaques, the group was selling them strictly on a "first-come-first served" basis.

Arts Council president Gretchen Day said that sponsors of the panels, still in preparation at four other schools, should be assured that these will be in place shortly.

Staff to attend convention despite council doubts

A proposal to sponsor eight members of the town's engineering department for \$1,500 worth of courses, meetings and conventions this winter and coming spring has irked at least two councillors.

While councillors Harry Levy and Roy Booth said they have no objection to members of staff honing their skills during these gatherings, both expressed concern about whether the department's con-

ventions budget could handle the costs.

"I have certain reservations," Coun. Levy, chairman of the town's budget committee said. "This year's budget is going to be very tough and there are many areas where we're going to have to make cuts. This (conventions and courses) may be one of them

and I'm reluctant to put a stamp of approval on anything occurring after March."

Despite concerns raised, councillors approved the motion allowing staff members to attend the meetings.

"These courses are all attempting to upgrade skills and the knowledge of our staff," Coun. Russ Knechtel argued.

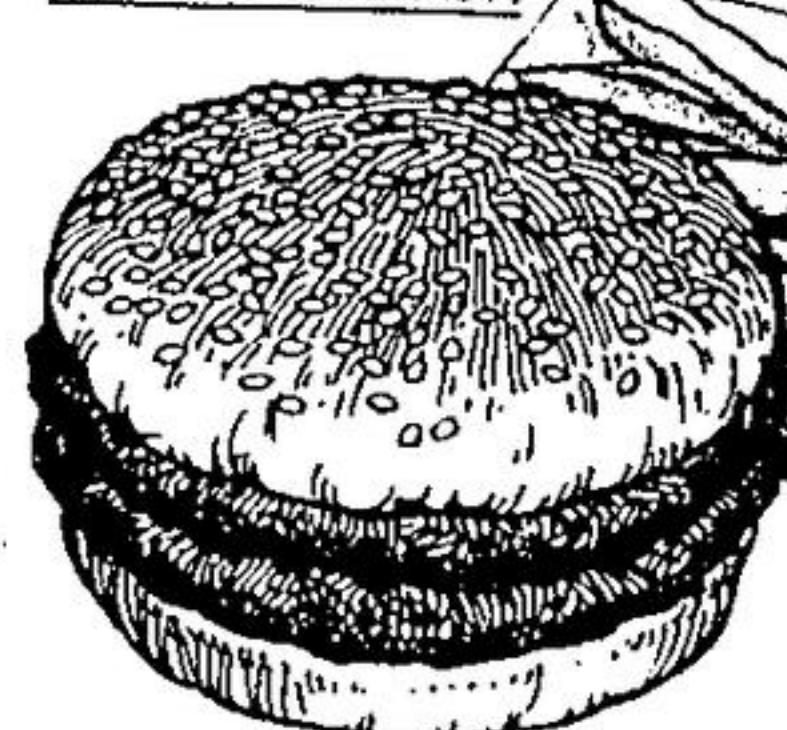
