#### Nobody's perfect: - but remember the wages of sin

Nobody's perfect. How often have you heard that

It's usually said with an attitude of resignation: "Oh, well, nobody's perfect."

People are willing to admit to a lot of mistakes: "After all, I'm only human." This is an old idea, for the ancient Roman philosopher Seneca said, "To err is human."

People admit mistakes of many kinds. Do they admit mistakes in their relationship to God? Yes, most people are willing to admit that they have not been perfect in their relationship to God. At least, they're willing to admit to a few small sins: "Oh, I haven't been the best person, but I'm not the worst either. And anyway, God is loving and forgiving, isn't He?".

The problem is that the attitude doesn't take God's Law seriously. The Ten Commandments are very strict, and they were interpreted very strictly by Jesus in His Sermon on the Mount (see Matthew 5). It's not as if God doesn't care that people sin. He has forbidden sin. And we are all sinners - with not just a few small sins but with quite a few pretty serious sins. Is there no hope?

Under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, St. Paul put the situation very precisely and concisely: "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6:23).

God loves sinners, but He does not just forgive them for no reason at all. Sin must be punished. Christ has given God the only possible reason to forgive us our sine. He suffered the punishment for our sins in our place. Jesus Christ, Who is true God as well as true Man, never sinned. But He became guility with all the sins of all of us. He suffered the punishment for them - for ust - when He suffered and died on the cross. He satisfied God's anger against our sins. He established peace with God.

The forgiveness of sins was earned on the cross for you. The forgiveness of sins is there, ready to be believed in. You will not care about it if you do not know how serious a problem sin is. God's Law tells you that it is serious. But the Good News of the forgiveness of sim for Christ's sake, that is God's means to bring you to faith in the forgiveness of sins. "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord."

The name Christian was given to the disciples or followers or Christ at Antioch. These followers were dedicated enough to give their very lives. All this for someone who did not even know If God was God? I find that very hard to believe.

## Reminder: chimneys often need cleaning

How often should your chimney be cleaned out?

It all depends on the type of fuel you are burning, reports Inspector Harold Penson of Milton Fire Department, who is the 1981 Chairman of Halton Region Fire Prevention Committee. Recent telephone solicitat-

ions of Halton residents by chimney cleaning firms prom-pted the Fire Prevention Committee to issue a statement on chimney cleaning. Insp. Pen-son said some solicitors are making statements that fire protection agencies are recommending all gas and oil fired chimneys need cleaning. All oil fired furnaces should

be cleaned and adjusted year-ly, he added, and at this time you should ask the service man to check the chimney. Gas fired furnaces do not require annual cleaning, but should be checked by a qualified service man every three years, he added.

Check (and change, if necessary) the filters in a forced air system once monthly during the heating season, he said.


