Obituary

George Mino was craftsman

Wilfred George Mino, owner of Mino Millwork, died Feb. 9. He was 66.

Mr. Mino was raised on the family farm on the Sixth Line, Limehouse. He attended the Seventh Line Public School and Georgetown District High School.

He apprenticed in cabinet-making with the late Howard Kentner of the old Georgetown Lumber.

Mr. Mino married the former Florence (Bubs) Hawes Sept. 3, 1937.

During the Second World War, Mr. Mino served with the RCAF from Oct. 11, 1943, to July 16, 1946, as Leading Aircraftman. He was with the Number 436 Elephant Squadron and was stationed for over a year in India and Burma. The squadron flew Dakotas on transport work in support of the British 14th Army. The name "Elephant Squadron" was chosen because it was considered appropriate for the locale in which the squadron was flying. The squadron was also known as the "Canucks Unlimited" and this name was painted across every aircraft.

When the Kentner family sold their business to Beaver Lumber in 1957, Mr. Mino took over the millwork section as his own business, while Beaver continued to sell lumber.

In 1968, Mr. Mino built and opened his own millwork manufacturing plant on Mountainview Road. He also did contract work for Thomson Newspapers, Dairy Queen and McDonald's, with the products being distributed from coast to coast.

Mr. Mino is survived by his wife, Florence, and their two daughters, Linda (Mrs. Fraser Hass) of Coldwater and Janice Little of Georgetown. He also has three grandchildren, Rebecca Hass and Greg and Amy Little.

Have you got your dog tags?

Concerned that hundreds of Halton Hills residents are late buying licenses for their pet dogs, town officials are circulating reminders among the news media.

The town issued 2,328 dog licenses throughout 1980, a spokesman explained, but thus far in 1981 has only issued 1,173, even though the deadline for buying them at various local agencies passed Feb. 15.

While licensing officers won't be penalizing any buyers for their lateness, failure to formally license a dog is an offence punishable by fines of up to \$50. Ontario's Dog Tax, Livestock and Poultry Protection Act is the controlling legislation.

Officials point out that government tax coffers aren't the only beneficiaries in the licensing program.

Your pet's dogtags enable the town's animal control officer to quickly alert you in the event of mishap or impoundment.

Residents are also reminded that it is their responsibility to license any dog 12 weeks old or older which they are keeping or "harboring" that is, feeding.

Licence fees this year are \$12 for non-neutered dogs, \$9

if spayed or neutered. Licences are available at the Halton Hills Animal Control Centre in Limehouse, Steven's General Store, also in Limehouse, either of the town's downtown offices in Acton and Georgetown, the Speyside General Store, Home Hardware in the Georgetown's Guelph Street Plaza or Decorating Fun in the Georgetown Market Centre.

While white page listings remain unchanged, some homes may have received the wrong phonebook for their area. Check the front yellow pages to ensure they cover Halton Hills, otherwise report the error to Bell's directory delivery associates in Brampton at 459-3755.

Remember Ontario Tax Credits at tax filing time.

Find out how you qualify:

If you're an Ontario resident under 65, you may qualify for one or more of three Ontario Tax Credits, even if you have no taxable income.

To claim the credits you must complete the mauve Ontario Tax Credit form and mail it together with your federal income tax return.

A reminder: Fill it in and mail it - Ontario Tax Credits are for you.



Property Tax Credit

The Property Tax Credit reduces the burden of municipal and school taxes. It is based on your property tax or rent and taxable income.

Sales Tax Credit

This credit returns a portion of money paid in provincial retail sales tax. It is based on personal exemptions and taxable income. The maximum amount that may be claimed for Property and Sales Tax Credits is \$500.

Attention Senior Citizens!

The Ontario Tax Grants introduced in 1980 replace Ontario Property and Sales Tax Credits for residents who were 65 years or older as of December 31, 1980. If you are filing a federal income tax return, you should not complete the Ontario Tax Credit form unless you are claiming the Political Contribution Tax Credit.

Nursing Home Residents

Residents in nursing homes and similar institutions are not usually eligible to claim the Property Tax Credit or the Property Tax Grant.
