

Orillia contains Georgetown defence in second game

Raiders down Terriers 7-3, 4-3

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders are now two games up on their playoff opponents the Orillia Terriers after a 7-3 blasting last Friday and a closer matchup Saturday 4-3. The Raiders took an early lead in their Saturday game at home as Gary Ford started things off for Georgetown on a goal from Steve Lyon just one minute into the first period. But two goals in the latter half of the first period saw the Terriers advance the score 2-1 by the end of the period. A fired-up Georgetown squad came alive in the second period with a three goal effort with John Cook, Rick Kessell and Mike Keeler scoring. The red and white managed to keep the

Terriers from scoring and thus led 4-2 at the end of the second period. Mike Keeler was a big factor for Georgetown in the third period as he assisted on all of the Raiders three goals. Joe Ens scored with four minutes left in the period on passes from Keeler and Juri Kudrasov. At the midway mark of the period Rick Kessell scored a power play goal from Colin Gordon and Mike Keeler. Ray Tonelli rounded off the scoring for the Raiders with eight minutes left in the game from Dan Eastman and Mike Keeler passes. Orillia added one more goal in the third period with five minutes left to go in the game to make the score Georgetown 7, Orillia 4.

The Raiders looked strong in the second and third periods but the slow start of Georgetown in the first period might have caused coach Gerry Inglis some worry. FOGAL BACK One surprise in the lineup for the Raiders was defence man Ron Fogal who started the game for Georgetown after missing the past five or six games. "He's big and sort of has the knack of having people respect him," the coach said. "He moves the puck up well and protects the goalie well in front of the net."

In the two playoff games coach Inglis has used three lines instead of the four lines that were used for most of the season. Inglis said he is sorry that some players have been left off the lineup. "But right now I have six right wingers," Inglis said. In an effort to give more players some ice time Inglis moved high scoring forward Ron Twiss back to defence so that there were three defensive pairings and three forward lines last Saturday in Orillia.

In their 4-3 victory over Orillia coach Inglis was disturbed at the refereeing. Not only that but Orillia put on a determined effort in the way they contained the Raider defence when they moved out of their own end, Inglis said. "Our defencemen are used to wheeling it, but they can't do it against Orillia. Orillia play it tough and double team the puck carrier." In Orillia the Terriers scored the only goal of the first period to lead 1-0. But within a minute of the second period John Cook scored on a pass from Rick Kessell and Ron Twiss. Goals by Tom Martin and Rick Kessell advanced the score to 3-1. However, a

goal by Orillia at the midway mark of the period made it 3-2 for Georgetown. In the third period Rick Kessell scored his second goal of the game on a power play shot from Joe Ens and John Cook. Orillia also scored on a power play effort midway through the period as the score ended 4-3 for Georgetown. Terrier president George Macnaoche refused to pay the referees at last Saturday's game in Orillia. Apparently Macnaoche was so angry at the outcome of the game and what Orillia called "two disputed third period goals" that he refused to pay the referees.

High school captures swim crown

Eric Elson swam impressively as he won the senior boy's 100m individual medley and the senior boy's 100 m. freestyle and placed second in the senior boy's 50m freestyle. Malcolm MacLeod also won his race as he came first in the junior boy's 50 metre freestyle. There were also many seconds and thirds that contributed to the Rebel's victory but they are too numerous to mention here. Part of the team's consistent domination of local swimming is the strength that Georgetown has displayed from top to bottom. Swimming is a team sport, said coach Tom Adams. They now qualify for the provincial swimming championships being held at Etobicoke on Friday for high school-trained swimmers and Saturday for open competition. The Georgetown District high school's domination at the Halton-Peel championships was complete as the swim team placed in 50 of 60 entries and scored 56 out of 60 entries to outdistance second place Queen Elizabeth Park by 170 points. The Rebel swim team was led by the outstanding performances of Cheryl Thompson who finished first in all three of her races with each of them being Halton-Peel records.

The team standings from the Peel-Haltoms were the same as the Haltoms with only the point totals different. The junior team standings were Georgetown with 345 points, followed by Q.E. Park and Nelson with 302 and 221 respectively. Senior team results had Georgetown in front with 507.5 points to Nelson's 208.5 and Q.E. Park's 184. The top three Halton teams finished in their same positions in Peel-Halton showing Halton's dominance in swimming. The Rebels claimed first place in the team title by 166.5 points over second place Q.E. Park as Georgetown combined total was 652.5 points to Q.E. Park's 486. Nelson came third with 439.5 points. Individual results were again led by the achievements of Cheryl Thompson as she obtained a triple victory, winning the junior girl's 100 metre freestyle, the junior girl's 100 metre individual medley and the junior girl's 50 metre breaststroke.
