### Our skaters remain world class

Glen Williams skater Kris Barber and dance partner Kelly Johnson competed against the world's best figure-skaters last weekend to finish an impressive

Barber and Johnson placed second behind Marie McNeit and Rob McCall in the Canadian championships one month ago to advance to the world figure-skating championships held in Hartford.

However, at the world championships the Barber-Johnson duo finished ahead of their Canadlan rivals -McNeil and McCall finished thirteenth overall.

For Kris Barber and his partner it was the first time they have skated in the world figure-skating championships so their finish was particularly meaningful. He and Kelly Johnson perform-

ed quite well although they skated better at the Canadian finals in Halifax February 1st Barber said.

Barber said there was only the other team that placed better in the world competition that had not been to the figure-skating champion-. ships before - that was the eleventh place team from England.

UPSETPRESSURE This was also the first time the Barber-Johnson team had beaten Canada's top pairing of McNeil and McCall. Barber said the pressure was also on McNeil and McCall to do well because, "they knew they might be upset by us,"

next year at the world figureskating championships. Because Canada did not place a skater in the top ten our country will only be able to send one skating pair next

Barber said that because he and Kelly Johnson have not been exposed to the European judges as much as the experienced skaters fresh from the European championships, they were at a disadvantage.

Although the skating duo did not attain their goals of placing first in the Canadian finals or in the top ten at the world's, "we were definitely pleased" Barber said of their performances this year.

To part of this end the provincial coach, Tony Taylor, is committed to go and find the talent and has been invited to



# Chewing his way to nostalgic card collection

For Morley Leeking, English teacher at Georgetown's District high school, collecting bubble gum cards is one way to take a nostalgic journey back to his youth.

But not only that, Leeking has one of the best gum card collections in Canada, perhaps within the top five collectors. With gum card collecting ranked third behind stamps and coins, Leeking's cards are worth much more than their nostalgle and aesthetic value.

Leeking says he has over 200,000 cards in his collection with some cards dating from 1888 when they were first introduced. Sports cards were first given out with cigarette and tobacco in the 1880s but in 1913 cards became available with candy.

In 1932 sports cards became available in bubble gum

packages. The Morley Lecking collection started when he was a youth, but most of his cards were thrown out. His interest in gum cards was re-kindled with the inception of the Toronto Blue Jays.

In 1977 there was an ad offering a complete set of Major League baseball cards and Leeking sent away for the

An avid baseball player and fan in his youth during the 1950s, Lecking started to collect other baseball cards in the 1970s. He went to garage sales and flea markets searching for gum cards to trade. INTEREST EXTENDED

displays and he started to travel to the United States to card shows. In the United States there are 6 million gum card collectors, Lecking says. "I started getting calls from Americans for Canadian

After two years his interest extended past local

variations of gum cards," Leeking says. "Americans want everything."



Leeking has met hundreds of interesting people in his travels which have taken him to such places as Michigan, Ohio and New York State. He hopes to attend a gum card convention in California within the next two years.

A person can go to conventions as either a dealer or you can pick up and buy cards yourself, Leeking says. His collection specialty is baseball, but he carries a large selection of hockey and football cards. "My pride is my baseball collection," Leeking says.

Leeking has almost the complete set of baseball gum cards from the 1950s and their condition is very good. Condition is important to a card just as it is in stamps. Each card is graded from a standard format and collectors often cancel deals if the standard is not up to par.

Leeking says his collection can take the pressure away from the day-to-day working schedule. "If I feel pressured, I go up and do some card sorting," Leeking says. FAMILY AFFAIR

His collecting is a family affair as wife Triencke enjoys helping search for cards at garage sales and flea markets as well as travelling to conventions. Leeking's children Andrea, 5, and Paul 14, also lend their support. "Andrea helps me sort cards into sets and Paul likes

to eat them," Leeking says. Leeking grew up in Burlington and attended the University of Western Ontario before moving to Halton county seven years ago. He started teaching at Georgetown's District High School seven years ago and has coached the senior and junior boys' basketball team since then. Only four months ago he bought a new house in Acton.

Last year Leeking had an article published in the Canadian magazine "Canadian Collector" which is about gum card collecting.



In Lecking's collectors den in his new house there is barely room for more cards, but he continues his search for additional sets to add to his collection.

As Lecking says, there is the nostalgla, the aesthetic, artistic appreciation of the cards, the fun of gaining hockey and baseball trivia and he has something to leave to his children.
