Soccer clinic teaches fundamentals to coaches



Canada's one hope to develop top international class soccer players could well come from the qualifications of its coaches so when Pineview offered a coaching clinic last weekend, it was certainly well received. The level one clinic arranged by the Recreation department and taught by Canadian Soccer Association instructors, taught soccer enthusiasts about the fundamentals of the game.

In the 16-hour, two-day course the students at the clinic were shown films, practiced writing tests and were shown the practical side of putting together a good practice for the team. Most of the participants were from the Halton Hills area with a majority of coaches coming from the Pineview Soccer club.

In the 16-hour course the time was broken up between theoretical and practical sessions. Participants were taught the principals of a warm-up, laws of the game, planning a practice session, as well as the different areas of the game that have to be

taught to the youngsters such as defending, long passing, shooting, dribbling and goal-tending.

The course goes in to a fair amount of detail on certain player responsibilities and techniques. The goalkeeper is a case in point. Instructors Jim Munro and Ron Borella had the students practicing diving techniques for the goalkeeper using various exercises. The instructors worked it so that from a kneeling, sitting and finally a squat position the goalkeeper would fall to catch a stationary ball placed on the ground.

ECONOMY

Ontario has vast potential not being utilized by the present Government. Davis has allowed Ontario to decline to tenth and last place among the Provinces in the rate of economic growth. Julian Reed says, "That's not good enough, we need an economic strategy for the next decade."
