Minor Atoms down Kitchener 5-2

The Al Piliut Minor Atoms hosted the Kitchener contingent for game one of the OMHA Zone two finals on March 9th and took a 5-2 decision over them.

Their first marker came at 11:45 on a goalmouth scramble and their second came at 10:08 when one of their players was left uncovered in front of the net.

A penalty to the visitors at 5:13 proved to be very costly as Georgetown netted three quick ones in just 46 seconds. Adam Bennett's high shot from the point dropped over the netminder's shoulder at 4:55. Andrew Hoddinott deflected one in at 4:31 and Travis Gardiner beat the goalie cleanly on a sharp angle shot at 4:09.

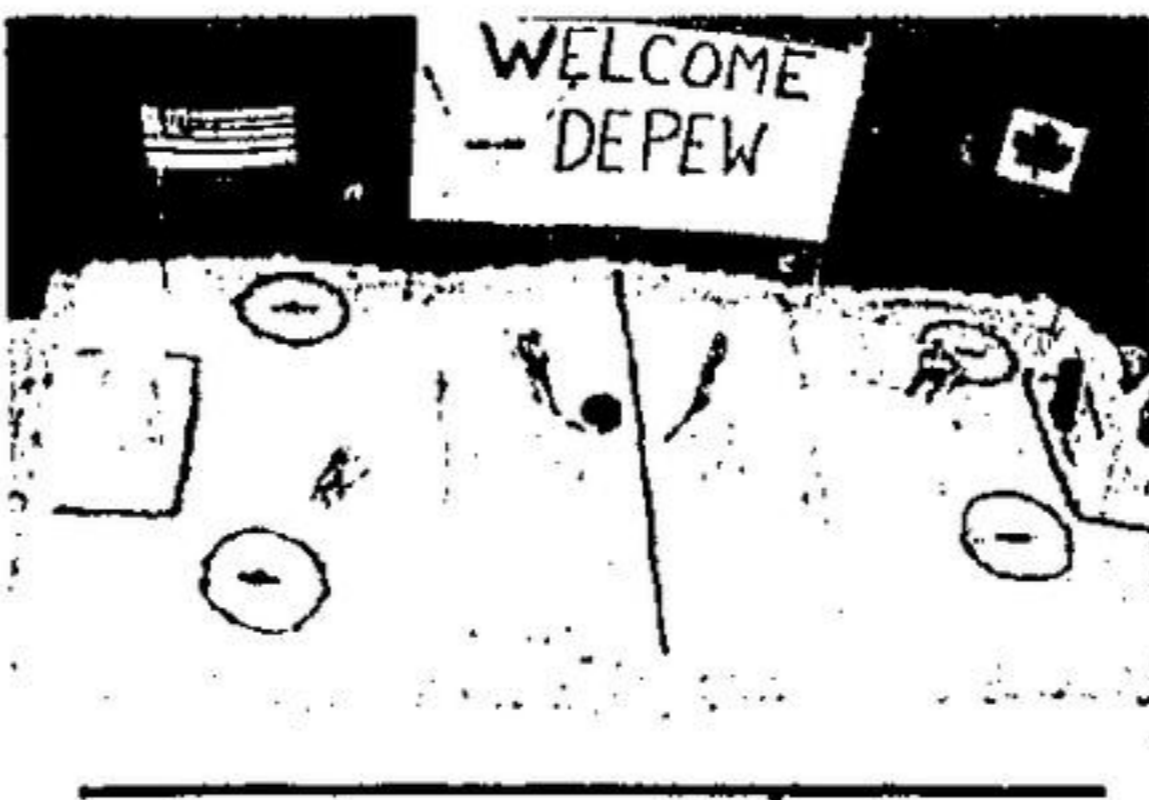
Assisting in this scoring flurry were Brent Presswood with a pair and Andrew Hoddinott, Adam Bennett, and Chris Stoddart with Singles.

'Zebco' line spinning reels

Trying to keep you, the reader, up to date on new products that reach the market is often a large task. When the item is as well known as the ZEBCO line, it is actually very simple. The greatest innovation in spinning reels, or any other reel for that matter, was the Zebco 144 released about this time last spring, and those who own them know how effective and versatile they are. Zebco has now released an extension of that line with the new Zebco Omega 154 spincast reel. For those fishermen who don't particularly like spincasts, these are the answer.

The 144 and 154 are hung under the rod rather than above like the regular spincast, and are released by a "trigger" rather than a push button. Right or left hand retrieve makes them very versatile and the answer to almost all your fishing needs. The 144 is an Ultralight and the 154 is designed for the 8-18 pound line user. Perfect for night fishing Bass where a tangle could ruin the night, and the straight line drag and silent selective anti-reverse make fishing these reels enjoyable.

If you are one of the 40,000 Ontario residents that were mailed a 1980 Provincial Fishing Survey, make sure you mail it back completed as requested. These surveys are vital to the future of sportfishing. Also don't forget that the new summary of the Fishing Regulation is now available. Better get one now and study it in order to keep within the law.

For example, Pike fishing is still open on Fairy Lake in Acton until March 31st. It was there last Saturday and the ice is 20 inches.

One of the calls I received last week was for information on how to preserve trout spawn for later use. Would the person who called (John) please call me back. I promised copies of several ways to preserve spawn, but I inadvertently threw his address and phone number away.

Here follows a list of some of the activities available at the risk of boring reading, yet stick with it and see if your favorite pastime is here. If not check the show program available at the door for ALL activities and times.

Archery, baseball with films, backpacking equipment and places to go, Boating of course in uppercast wing, camping and all that goes with it. Of course there is canoeing, climbing, and of greatest interest, fishing with equipment, supplies, demonstrations and actually all there is to see and do during the closed season.
