**School board readies Glen gym addition**

Plans to enlarge Glen Williams Public School narrowly passed the Halton Board of Education Thursday night.

Concerned that declining enrollment in the future may not justify a proposed \$385,000 addition to the school, board members reluctantly agreed to go ahead with the project which could be completed by next autumn.

"I was surprised that there should be any question at all," Halton Hills trustee Betty Walker said Monday. "It's the last of the schools under a board revamping program to be done here. Why shouldn't it go through?"

The project will add 4,500 square feet to the existing building, and will include a larger general purpose room (gym), storage areas and change rooms.

Board chairman Em Lavender maintained that there is a growing trend to keep community schools, not close them. This could make a

favorable difference in the school's population later, he said.

The expansion will relocate offices as more room becomes available. The school's current library will get larger quarters as well.

While the school can accommodate 320 students, its present enrollment is 207. Forecasts for the next five years say this may vary to between 200 and 153 pupils.
